River Days Meets Set One Today, Six Slated Sunday

It's front and center for the Willamette River Days sports parade Saturday and Sunday. With the exception of the junior golf meet and the tennis tournament, all the sports meets will windup on Sunday.

Saturday the water skiers take over a stretch of the Willamette River north of the bridges for an obstacle run. Three events are planned. One for 16 years and under using two skis, another in the unlimited age class using two skis and the third event is unlimited using one ski only. Time of the event is 1:30 p.m. and Al Shannon is in charge. Entry fee is \$1.00 for a River Days button.

Sunday is the big day. Six events and tournaments are slated to take place including a rifle shoot, baton twirling, bowling, horseshoes, roller skating and quarter midget racing, plus the tennis tournament.

The rifle shoot will be held at the Four Corners Rod and Gun Club grounds, which is east of Four Corners on State Street. Seven matches are planned, including one pistol shoot. Entry fee is a "button" for each event entered or six for the entire card. Gold, silver and bronze medals go to the top three shooters in each event. The matches are scheduled to start at 8:30 a.m. and registration is open until noon. Bob Allen and Harvey Wetzel are in charge of the meet.

The bowling tournament is under the direction of Dick Phipps and will be held at Cherry City Bowl. Entry fee is \$2.00, which includes the usual "button" and pays for the bowling. The tournament is open to boys and girls 18-years old and younger. Handicaps are based on 70 per cent of 190. Eight trophies, four to the boys and a like number to the girls will be awarded.

Fangio May Go to Monza

MONZA, Italy (AP)—The manager of world auto racing champion Juan Manuel Fangio Friday night said the Argentine ace would drive in Sunday's 500-mile at Monza.

A few hours earlier Fangio led a field of top American and European drivers with the fastest time for Sunday's race.

Marcello Giambertone—Fangio's European manager who often has been more optimistic about Fangio participating in races than Fangio himself—said the Argentine driver had accepted all American conditions for driving an American car in the race, even if it meant Fangio would lose money.

Giambertone's statement came as organizers of the race officially announced that Fangio definitely would participate.

However, representatives of the American Dean Van Lines Company—owners of the Dean Van Lines Special which Fangio is driving—said they had received no notification from the race organizers or Giambertone that Fangio had accepted their terms.

The 44-year-old racing great drove the Dean Van Lines Special three laps at an average speed of 171.4 miles per hour over the 2.6-mile banked course.

STANTON, Del. (AP)—Cavan, the best Irish horse who won the Belmont Stakes over the injured Tim Tam, is out to prove Saturday that the victory was deserved—and no fluke.

The Joseph E. O'Connell thoroughbred heads a field of 11 three-year-olds entered in the \$47,000 Leonard Richards Stakes at Delaware Park. And if all 11 go to the post, the winner will collect exactly \$35,000.

Pierce Perfect for 8 1/3 Innings; Fitz Gerald Doubles With Two Out

CHICAGO (AP)—Veteran left hander Billy Pierce pitched 8 1/3 innings of perfect ball Friday night and lost his bid for a pitching masterpiece when pinch hitter Ted Fitz Gerald doubled to right field as the Chicago White Sox defeated Washington 3-0.

Fitz Gerald belted Pierce's first pitch down the right field line. Pierce then struck out Albie Pearson to end the game.

The triumph was the third straight shutout for Pierce. The crowd of 11,300 booed loudly when Fitz Gerald stepped to the plate and jeers got louder when umpire Charley Berry signalled the ball fair.

Pierce didn't walk a man and faced only 28 batters, one over the minimum. Pierce, who never has had a no-hitter, now has three one hitters and 29 shutouts in his career.

The 31-year-old southpaw doubled in the third inning and came home with the only run needed.
