

Variety Of Events Scheduled

Salem's July 4th Willamette River Days Festival is one of many celebrations scheduled over the state during the month of July, according to the Travel Information Division of the State Highway Department.

The schedule includes 11 rodeos, almost as many fireworks celebrations and other such major festivals as the Bend Water Pageant, Albany Timber Carnival and start of the Oregon Shakespearean Festival at Ashland. Hundreds of thousands of visitors are expected in the state during the month.

First rodeos of the month will be the Fourth of July Celebration and Rodeo at Baker July 3-4; the St. Paul Rodeo at St. Paul, July 3-5; and the Molalla Buckaroo at Molalla, July 3-6.

Amateur Rodeo

Others through the month will be the Paulina Amateur Rodeo, Paulina, July 4; Yoncalla Amateur Rodeo, Yoncalla, July 4-5; Junior Rodeo, Enterprise, July 4-5; Northwest Roundup, Klamath Falls, July 4-6; Cottage Grove Rodeo, Cottage Grove, July 11-13; Elgin Stampede, Elgin, July 19-20; Klamath Basin Roundup, Klamath Falls, July 25-27; and Chief Joseph Days, Joseph, July 25-27.

Bend's Water Pageant, in which colorful floats are spotlighted at night on the slow-moving Deschutes River, will be July 4-5. The World Championship Timber Carnival is July 24, with logging contests such as climbing, bucking and log rolling slated for the afternoons of July 3 and 4.

Shakespearean Festival

The Oregon Shakespearean Festival, one of the West's most unique events, will get one of its earliest starts in history when it opens at Ashland July 28. The festival will continue through September 4, with four Shakespearean plays appearing in nightly rotation.

Among other important events on the schedule compiled by the Travel Information Division of the Oregon State Highway Department are Willamette River Days at Salem July 4; Dallas Smileroo at Dallas July 25-27; Robin Hood Festival at Sherwood, July 24-26; and the Santiam Bean Festival at Stayton July 28-Aug. 2.

Fireworks displays will be held at many of these festivals as well as at Manzanita, Seaside, Waldport, Ashland and Taft, all on July 4.

Some of the Oregon events slated for the early part of July include the Happy Days Celebration at Hillsboro July 4; Beachcombers' Days Pageant at Waldport July 4; Warrenton Mooring Basin Dedication at Warrenton July 4; Oregon AAU Track Meet at Eugene July 4-5; Friendship Jamboree at Vernonia July 4-5; Water Ski Festival at Dorena Reservoir south of Cottage Grove July 6; and Siskiyou Music camp at Ashland July 6-19.

Water Festival

Another water show will be the Nehalem Bay Water Festival near Wheeler July 19-20, while Cascade Locks will feature a Fly-in Celebration July 20-21. A similar event, Lebanon Air Day, will be held at Lebanon July 27.

Square dancers are looking forward to the Oregon Square Dance Festival, scheduled for the Eugene-Springfield area July 18-22. The Oregon State Broiler Festival also will be at Springfield, July 19.

International Summer Ski School is continuing at Timberline Lodge through July 6. Greyhounds open at the Fairview Race Track in Portland July 14, and that meet will continue until Nov. 1.

Other events on tap for July are the Order of Antelope Meeting at Hart Mountain northeast of Lakeview, July 11-13; Archery Tournament at Sherwood Field in Portland July 18; Cheerleaders' Clinic at Oregon State College in Corvallis July 21-25; Miss Oregon Pageant at Seaside July 25-27; Yoncalla Bay Rendezvous of the Oregon Historical Society, Newport, July 26-27; Annual Hotcake Breakfast at Amity City Park July 27; and the Multnomah County Fair, Gresham, July 31-Aug. 9.

U.S. Reveals Atomic Blast

WASHINGTON (AP)—The tenth announced nuclear detonation of the current tests in the Pacific took place Saturday.

The atomic Energy Commission announced that the latest test was at 3:30 p.m., EDT, U.S. time.

The test was part of the hard-tack nuclear weapons test series at the Eniwetok proving ground.

The eighth and ninth announced detonations were Friday. Both the AEC and the Defense Department have declined to expand their terse announcements of the detonations.

Solons Ask End To Aluminum Dip

WASHINGTON (AP)—Twelve senators from aluminum processing states asked the government Friday to take steps to reverse what they called the downward trend of the domestic aluminum industry.

The senators sent a joint letter to seven federal agencies urging an early meeting for this purpose. Sens. Warren Magnuson and Henry Jackson, Washington Democrats who were among the signers, said one third of the nation's productive capacity in the aluminum industry now is shut down.

They said this is partly because of increased aluminum imports, principally from friendly countries whose aluminum markets are effectively closed to U. S. manufacturers.
