

Russ Participation in Atom Talks Seen by U.S. Officials

WASHINGTON (AP)—Encouraged by a change in Russia's attitude, U. S. officials said Sunday the nuclear test talks due to open at Geneva Tuesday might possibly lead to a break in the disarmament deadlock.

The negotiations are to be carried on by scientists of the United States and three Western Allies with scientists of Russia and three Soviet-bloc countries. They should at least show whether the Soviet government means business when it talks about backing up an international nuclear test system.

If Russia shows itself ready to accept a workable inspection system, even on the limited scale necessary to police a prohibition on testing, other steps toward disarmament might be more easily worked out. The issue of inspection has been at the heart of the disarmament deadlock since the United States first proposed a program to control atomic weapons more than 10 years ago.

U. S. officials said Sunday that Russia's attitude has changed since the Geneva conference. The other Communist governments will be fully represented when the Geneva conference Western scientists gather on their side of the table Tuesday.

Wreck Hurts 3 in Family

Three members of a rural Gervais family were treated as outpatients at Salem Memorial Hospital about 2:30 p.m. Sunday after a two-car accident at Market Street and Lancaster Avenue, city first aidmen said.

They were Wesley Alt, 54, Route 1 Box 114, Gervais, lacerated chin and forehead; his wife, Ethel, 54, bruises and leg injuries and shock; and son Alvin, 16, lacerated forehead. No injuries to occupants of other car were reported. Their identity was not reported by officials.

James Walker, Portland, riding in the lead car with his father, James Z. Walker, and sister, Debra, 2, suffered a head cut and was treated as an outpatient at Salem Memorial Hospital.

His mother was in the station wagon. State police said the boy was pinned into a space of about four inches between the steering wheel and the crushed roof of the car. It was necessary to dig under the wreckage to remove the boy through the windshield.

Graham Warns of Trend to Attitude of Beat Generation
SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—Evangelist Billy Graham Sunday night warned there is a trend toward the "beat generation" attitude in this country — and that man has broken fellowship with God through sin.

Graham, opening his eight-day Sacramento crusade at the state fairgrounds, said there appears to be a stiffening of the Russian attitude which he said indicates the world is entering a period of great danger.

"There are but the external problems in the world," Graham said. "The spiritual problem is men who feel an incompleteness, fulfillment and an emptiness in life."

He said there is a trend toward the "beatnik" or "beat generation" attitude where there are no inhibitions. This attitude, Graham said, is one which says: "I'm going to get mine and enjoy it today and not worry about tomorrow."

"This is a sin, because man was not made to take life lightly. Life is a serious matter. We were never to be escapists—we were to face the realities of life and with Christ conquer them."

"Man has broken fellowship with God through sin. It is only through faith in Christ that we can restore this fellowship."

"It is only at the cross where we meet Christ that we receive forgiveness and are reconciled to God. In the cross, which is foolishness to the unbelieving world, is the secret of a new world and a new order of things," Graham said.

A crowd of 18,450 attended the crusade opener. More than a third had to sit on the grass after the 10,000 seats in the stands and 2,000 more on the race track were filled.

Cloaked in Uncertainty
Moscow had cloaked its own plans in confusion and uncertainty last Wednesday by announcing it would not send scientists to Geneva unless the United States in effect committed itself now to a suspension of all nuclear weapons testing.

Such a commitment—as the Soviet government presumably knows — is impossible. President Eisenhower has made no final decision on U. S. policy and has been awaiting action by Congress on legislation which would permit the United States to share nuclear weapons secrets with Britain.

Without such sharing, Britain is unwilling to hamper its own weapon program by halting tests. And without allied agreement the United States is unwilling to make any deal with Russia.

By Sunday, however, there were these indications that the Soviet Communist scientists would be on hand at the opening session:

1. A new note from Moscow Saturday again put pressure on the United States to agree to suspension of testing at once but it failed to repeat the boycott threat. The note even said that the experts ought to begin their work "the U. S., Soviet and other governments should at once reach a full and clear-cut agreement on what the aim of that work should be."

2. Authoritative informants in Moscow said that Soviet scientists who had already been named to attend the meeting had obtained visas from the Swiss Embassy for their trip to Geneva.

3. By Sunday afternoon word had come from U. S. officials on hand in the Swiss city that the Soviet-bloc scientists were on their way.

The Soviet government informed Washington on Tuesday that its scientists and those of Poland, Czechoslovakia and Romania would be present in Geneva in time for the July 1 opening.

Agreement had already been achieved that the talks should last about a month and that their purpose should be to devise ways and means of detecting any nuclear weapons test that might be held in attempted secret violation of an international test ban.

Soviet Premier Khrushchev had insisted all along that first there should be agreement on calling off tests and then a negotiation on details of supervising the moratorium. President Eisenhower had proposed that the scientific problems of enforcement be discussed first without prejudice to the later agreement on actually banning nuclear experiments.

Khrushchev reluctantly agreed to try the President's method.

Boycott Threatened
On Wednesday, 24 hours after everyone here thought final accord had been achieved, the Soviets made their boycott threat.

It had every appearance of an effort to bluff or frighten the United States into a hasty change of policy in order to save the Geneva talks from failure before they began.

Its real purpose, however, may have been to dramatize Russia's demands for a nuclear test ban. And there was always a possibility that the Soviets actually did not want to get down to brass tacks on any questions which would lead to detailed talk about an international inspection system behind the Iron Curtain.

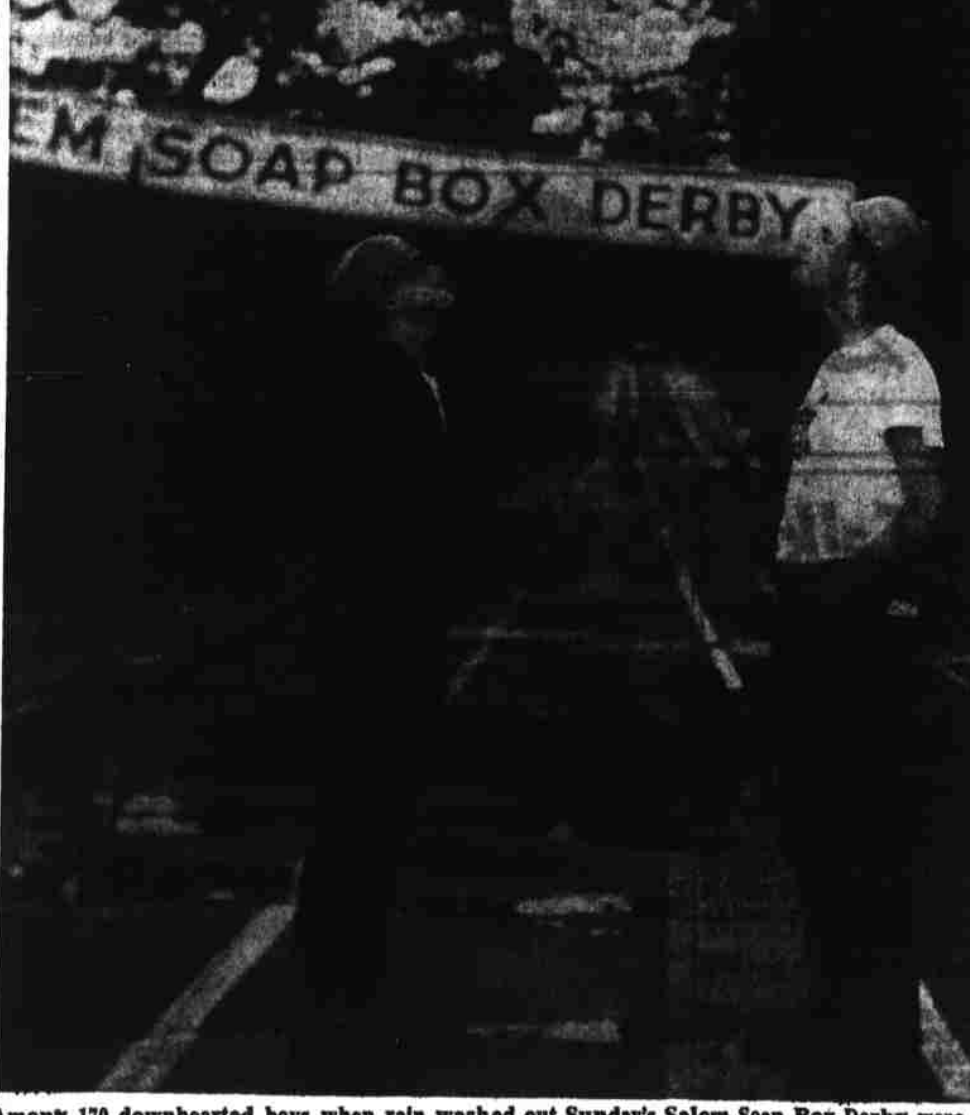

Americans 'Won't Realize' Higher Cost of Education

CLEVELAND (AP)—The American people just won't realize that in public education they're getting only what they're willing to pay for, the president of the National Education Assn. declared Sunday.

Dr. Lyman Ginger of the University of Kentucky, in a news conference kicking off the NEA's 96th annual convention, added: "Money alone won't cure the ills of public education, but we'll never cure them without more money."

He said the four most crucial needs of education today are adequate financial support to enable the schools to get better teachers, better programs of teacher preparation, stepped-up classroom construction to end overcrowding and half-day sessions, and expanded guidance and counseling services.

"Not Conceivable"
"It's just not conceivable to me that this nation cannot support public education," Dr. Ginger said. "We're going to have to tackle this problem at every level — in the communities, the states and on the federal level."

Dr. Ginger acknowledged that many goals of the NEA probably won't be realized for years.

For instance, in a proposed new platform which will come up for discussion during the convention there is the plank that no basic learning class in elementary schools should have more than 25 pupils per teacher.

This would require about 200,000 more grade school teachers — and the country is already short some 135,000 teachers.

The national average now is about 30 pupils per teacher in grade school.

The new program also calls for instruction programs which teach about — but do not advocate — communism and all forms of totalitarianism.

Platform Highlights
Other platform highlights include:

A complete school day and a school year of at least 180 days for every pupil who can profit from full-time classroom instruction.

Education beyond the high school for all youths who have both the desire and the ability to benefit from it.

In every classroom a teacher with at least four years of college education.

Provisions for both general and specialized education for our changing modern society.

An adequately financed program of public education in every school district.

School attendance laws in every state which would require attendance to age 18 or through secondary school, with provisions for work permits at 16 where individually desirable.

Man Discovered Dead in Residence
John Winston, about 61, was found dead about 4 p.m. Sunday at his residence at 215 Winter St. S.E. The corner's office reported he had been dead about 24 hours. Investigating police and the coroner said death was apparently of natural causes.

2 Tots Die in Refrigerator
LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—A 6-year-old boy and his 5-year-old sister suffocated Sunday in a refrigerator in a vacant house near their home here.

Barton Manning Jr., and his sister, Christ, children of a used car salesman, left their home about 9:30 a.m. They said they were going to play with neighboring children.

Shortly before noon James Blanton entered the unoccupied but furnished house into which he was planning to move.

Blanton opened the refrigerator door. He found the bodies of the two children huddled inside.

Efforts of a resuscitator squad failed to revive the victims.

The Mannings have no other children.

New Bid Seen for 9 Airmen

MOSCOW (AP)—U. S. Ambassador Llewellyn E. Thompson Jr. awaited word from Washington Sunday to press for release of nine American airmen forced down inside Soviet Armenia by two Russian jets.

Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko told Thompson Saturday the nine were unarmed and are being well cared for. Gromyko charged the United States had made a crude violation of Soviet airspace. He said the plane burned on landing.

Deny Violation
In Washington, the Defense Department said there is no truth in the Soviet charge that the plane—a DC-6A—deliberately violated Russian airspace. It said the State Department was instructing Thompson to seek the prompt release of the six officers and three airmen aboard.

(The statement indicated the plane may have gotten lost in overcast weather while on a flight to Iran with a cargo consigned to the U. S. military and diplomatic missions in Iran and Pakistan. The flight originated in Wiesbaden, Germany, stopped on Cyprus and was last reported over Adana, Turkey, at 6:23 a.m. Friday, the statement said.)

Thompson is expected to present the U. S. side of the incident and ask for the return of the crewmen and whatever is left of the plane.

Soviets' Claim
The plane was intercepted by Soviet radar as it flew 105 miles inside Armenia Friday, the Soviet announcement said. It added that the plane ignored the Russian pilots' signals to follow them to the nearest airfield and flew another 50 miles before it was forced to land.

The Russians said the plane landed and burst into flames.

Flying Saucers Fans End Convention in Ozark Hills

MOUNTAIN VIEW, Mo. (AP)—Several hundred people who claim to have seen or traveled in flying saucers—or at least to believe in them—wound up a weekend convention on an Ozark mountain-top Sunday.

Mr. and Mrs. David McClure of Tulsa, Okla., helped to send the believers away on a proper note by reporting a fresh saucer sighting.

Mrs. McClure said they spotted the object shortly after the convention recessed Saturday night. The McClures said two carloads of other delegates also saw it.

"Through binoculars the object looked white-orange," Mrs. McClure reported.

"It couldn't have been a satellite," she said. "Did you ever see a satellite dip, hover, and maneuver? No, it wasn't a satellite."

The principal speaker Sunday was Wayne S. Adair of Washington, D. C., who described himself as a former major in Army intelligence. He said he is director of an organization called Washington Saucer Intelligence.

"We must face reality," he said. "It's unreasonable to assume the earth isn't being watched by outer spacemen. We have too many signs of contact, such as telepathic communication, the fact that space craft have been seen darting down upon last-minute firing preparations at Cape Canaveral."

Aho did not amplify the remarks.
