SHEEP BRIDGE, WICKIUP RESERVOIR (Special)—It has been a number of years since we have had an extended vacation. But Mrs. Goin after 'em and your writer finally have a camp set in the out-of-doors. We must not forget our Labrador, Deck. Our dog didn't know that people sometimes had vacations, and probably thinks this is the goofiest duck hunting trip he ever saw.

It will probably take us a week to learn how to relax. Even in that length of time it is going to be difficult. How can anyone relax when rain trout are splashing and swirling within casting distance of the typewriter?

We watched four deer yesterday. Three of them on the way in here, in the middle of day and one in the evening while we were fly fishing near the mouth of Brown Creek. A pair of mallards just flew by earlier this morning (we arose at 5:30 a.m.) a pair of osprey were busy diving for fish just a few yards away. A bald eagle winged its way south, probably to its hunting ground.

The sun is beginning to climb in the sky now and it has all the earmarks of being a hot day. It is a welcome relief after the recent heavy rains. The North Twin road is still a series of rain puddles, some of them axle deep. When it rains in this country it really rains.

Checking with some of the other campers, we learn that fishing has been good in spite of the heavy algae in the water. Trolling here at Wickiup seems to be the favorite, although we observed several bait fishermen and bait plunkers. Only two or three other fly fishermen were in evidence yesterday and aside from a few small rainbows we saw nothing taken. Larger trout were rising but all of them were out in deep water where we could not reach with our hip boots.

East and Paulina Lakes have been steady producers according to the local anglers, and Lava Lake has been producing some fine eastern brook trout. We shall probably visit all as well as other spots around here, and will try and keep you informed with "on the spot" dope.

The small rainbow here in Wickiup (seven to nine inches) are the fattest, liveliest fish we have ever seen. They certainly do not appear to be hatchery releases. In looking them over very carefully they would appear to be small Kamloops. However, we don't know if any of the Kamloops variety are in Wickiup. We'll have to check on that.

We are a little more comfortable on this trip than on several we can look back on. As one gets older and covered with a mop of gray hair, the comforts are appreciated. Jack Miller of Salem, was thoughtful in letting us use one of his Vacation-Land house trailers. Mrs. G. A. is especially pleased with the comforts and ease of trailer camping. Of course, we brought along our charcoal grill and there is nothing like a nice evening meal of charcoal broiled trout or a good eastern Oregon T-Bone steak. Deck even enjoys his dog food more out here under the pines.

Speaking of pines, the poor dog was tired beyond words last night when we turned in. After all he has never seen so many trees. Too, he has never seen so much water all in one place and was eager to swim out and retrieve every fish he saw jump. He really keeps busy.

Senators Plan Second Half Play

Attendance Hike Prompts Directors to Continue Ball Operation

They didn't achieve their goal of 10,000. Two nasty rainouts saw to that. But the Salem Senators will nonetheless call on into the second half of Northwest League play, starting Tuesday night at Wenatchee.

This was the unofficial word last night at Waters Field, when the "No Game, Rain" signs were again hung up for the second

time during the crucial "Baseball or Bust" week.

Only 2,180 customers were needed for last night's doubleheader with Yakima to make the 10,000 total. At the rate the fans had turned out for the earlier portion of the big week, the necessary 2,180 would have been present last night were it not for the rainout.

Senators directors are to convene this morning to give the official word on whether the club

will or will not move into second half play. There is little doubt now that the operation will continue.

The response to the "Baseball or Bust" week has been termed "wonderful" and "beyond expectations." For the four nights the club was able to get into action—and most of those nights were cold and threatened by rain—a total of 7,820 fans dotted the previously poorly occupied ball park stands.

The week opened on Tuesday night with a rainout. Undaunted, folks who want to see the Senators keep aloft turned out 2,226 strong on Wednesday night. Another 2,014 showed up Thursday. Friday's count was down to 1,346, but on Saturday night a rip-roaring 2,334 were there.

"It's very obvious the people of Salem want their ball club to keep on existing," a club spokesman told last night.

Up until the big week was launched, attendance at the games here had been at an all time low. One report from the business office listed only 6,440 as paid admissions for the first 20 local appearances this season.

Needing to feel the pulse of the public for fear it had left the Senators to die, the directors called for the "Baseball or Bust" week and an attendance of 10,000 for the final seven games of the first half.

Manager Vern Kindfather and his brilliant athletes did much to help the big drive. They had won eight of 11 games on the road prior to moving home for the do-or-die week. During the week they bounced Wenatchee two games out of three and broke even in two with Yakima.

Even though Salem wound up in last place in the first half standings, the club has won 11 of its last 16 games. Since Kindfather took over as manager June 3, his record is 15-10.

With the addition of two or three more players in the right spots, Kindfather believes he'll have a solid outfit for the second half.

Veteran pitcher Don Robertson, who has been a successful hurler in the Mexican League the last two seasons and who was a big winner at Tri-City in 1953-54 is to join the club this week.

Kindfather may have to find another catcher, for it is possible Milt Martin will return to his job in Vancouver, Wash. Martin joined the Senators only as a fill-in when Don Lundberg left and has turned in a fine all-around job. It is doubtful he can remain with the squad much longer, however.

Salem is to open second half play Tuesday night at Wenatchee, while Eugene is at Tri-City and Lewiston at Yakima. Salem is at Yakima July 3 and 4, and then returns to Waters Field next Saturday and Sunday nights to play Eugene.

Palmer 1st In Golf Go

Jay Hebert 2nd At Long Island

EAST NORWICH, N.Y. (AP)—Shooting a par 71 for his final 18 holes after three straight subpar rounds, Arnold Palmer won the \$8,000 top money in the \$50,000 Long Island Open golf tournament Sunday with a 273.

The Latrobe, Pa., pro, with a record under the first day led through the 72-hole event. Until the final day, when he held his own, he increased his lead by the day with his scores of 66-69-67 and 71. He won by five strokes.

First it was George Bernardin of Miami Springs, Fla., and the venerable E.D. "Dutch" Harrison of St. Louis who made a run at the leader, finishing two strokes behind him opening day. Jimmy Demaret of Klamath Falls, N.Y., then took over the runnerup spot, but he was three strokes behind at the end of the second day.

Then it was Ted Kroll of Sarasota, Fla., who challenged, and at the end of the third round he was second, five strokes back.

And Sunday, when the runner-up spot meant \$4,600 the honor went to Jay Hebert of Sanford, Fla., who shot a 68 to finish with a 278 total.

Don Fairfield of Casey, Ill., held tenaciously to the third spot, and his 70 Sunday and 279 total was good for third. Sam Snead of White Sulphur Springs, W.Va., Kroll, and Bob Rosburg of Palo Alto, tied at 280 for fourth.

The pattern for the final day was set on the first hole. Kroll, playing in the threesome just ahead of Palmer, was only five feet from the pin with his second shot on the par 5 hole. He missed the putt for an eagle, which would have given him two eagles in a row, as he wound up his third round with a two under par.

Palmer was over the green with his second, chipped about 15 feet short, then sank the putt to match Kroll's birdie. So instead of cutting Palmer's margin to three strokes Kroll failed to gain an inch, and he subsequently faded to a 73.

By his victory Palmer, already the leading money winner of the tour for "official" events, increased his earnings to \$35,260. His earnings in unofficial events bring the total to \$37,564.

Holt Canned By Spokane

SPOKANE (AP)—Goldie Holt, manager of the Spokane Indians of the Pacific Coast baseball League, was fired Sunday, according to Danny May, sportswriter for the Spokesman-Review.

May quoted Dick Walsh, president of the Indians, and said Holt will be replaced by a man "with major league experience."

May said that Walsh told him the new manager will take over direction of the club Tuesday, when the Indians open at home against Sacramento.

This was Holt's first year as a triple A manager, although he managed in the Texas league and Southern Assn., both Double A circuits. He has been in baseball for the last 20 years.

Holt said "I have no immediate plans but I'll stay in the game." May reported Holt's dismissal in a dispatch from Phoenix where the Indians wound up a PCL series Sunday.
