

Teamsters Set Mass Confab to Discuss Probe

PORTLAND, April 6 (U)—A group of Teamster Union members, contending they were getting the run-around from Joint Council officers, today tentatively scheduled a mass meeting to be held in the public auditorium here April 14.

The group, which calls itself the Rank and File Committee, said union members should be brought together to discuss disclosures made at the Senate subcommittee investigating labor racketeering. "We want to look into the union situation which we are now confronted with. We want to band the men together to take appropriate steps to correct it," said Robert Miller, a member of a Portland local and chairman of the Rank and File Committee.

There are some 12,500 Teamsters in Oregon and Northwestern Washington. The civic auditorium here will hold about 4,000.

Miller announced plans for the mass rally after the Joint Council of Teamsters referred a demand for the rally back to the 10 locals. M. E. Steele, president of the council, said in a statement to the press that if all the locals in Oregon and Northwestern Washington favor such a mass meeting, the council will again "consider the matter."

Miller said of Steele's refusal to order the mass rally: "I suppose they feel they can whip us if they stall us."

Clinic Dates Announced for 2nd Series of Polio Shots

A schedule of clinics for the second round of polio vaccinations has been arranged by school and county health authorities. They will be conducted at the regular health centers in the county.

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Tanker Safe After Aqaba Run

EILAT, Israel, April 6 (U)—An American tanker with 16,500 tons of oil for Israel sailed unmolested through the disputed Gulf of Aqaba today and anchored in this southern Israeli port.

Nearly all Eilat's 2,000 population turned out to greet the first tanker ever to dock here. It also is the largest ship ever to arrive at this budding port.

The event was big news in Israel. Officials took the tanker's arrival as a symbol of U.S. support for Israel's contention the Gulf is an international waterway, open to all shipping.

Egypt and Saudi Arabia contend the gulf is Arab territorial water. Saudi Arabia, on the gulf's eastern shore, has threatened to renew the Arab blockade that once kept Israel's ships from Aqaba and the port of Eilat.

A government spokesman in Jerusalem said the tanker was but one of a number contracted for with an American company to carry oil to Eilat. He said eventually the tankers will be arriving at the rate of three or four a month.

Israeli authorities declined to permit disclosure of the name of the tanker, which was flying the U.S. flag. It had been at sea for 12 days.

The tanker will begin pumping oil into huge, newly constructed storage tanks tomorrow. It will take two days to unload and then will depart.

Heart Attack Takes Life of M. W. Fowler

Myrtle Walter Fowler, 40, of 1307 Clearview Ave., died of a heart attack Saturday en route to a doctor's office.

Fowler, an employee of the Oregon Pulp and Paper Co., was born April 2, 1917 in Muscatine, Iowa. He was a resident of Salem nearly eight years and a member of the Assembly of God Church and of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, Lodge No. 1842.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Marian Jean Toney, Salem; Miss Norma June Fowler, Salem; four sons, Myrtle Walter Jr., Robert L., Gary Lee and Larry Lee Fowler, all of Salem, and two sisters, Mrs. Lucille Hartman and Mrs. Vivian Cochran, Muscatine, Iowa.

Services are pending at the Howell-Edwards Mortuary.

Two Escape Plane Crash At Lapine

LAPINE, Ore.—Two Washington men escaped serious injury about noon Saturday when their light plane crashed at the state-owned airstrip here. Use of auto gas as fuel was believed responsible for the accident, State Board of Aeronautics officials said.

O. E. Smith, Mead, Wash., owner of the Aerona Champion and a student pilot, suffered no more than a shaking up when the plane plunged from a low altitude shortly after taking off. J. W. Cullen, Spokane, believed piloting the aircraft, sustained superficial cuts but was taken to a Bend hospital for observation.

The plane was almost completely demolished in the crash.

Earl Snyder, director of the State Bureau of Aeronautics, said at Salem that information to him indicated the plane had taken on a load of automobile gas at Lapine. Snyder said the two men reportedly were en route from Sacramento, Calif., to Spokane when they landed at Lapine to get fuel.

Snyder said the car gas apparently was the only fuel available. Ralph Scroggin, mayor of Lebanon and chairman of the State Board of Aeronautics, happened to be inspecting the airstrip at time of the accident and helped in rescue operations.

Four Killed in State Wrecks

Injured Man 'Unchanged'

SCIO, April 6—A hospital attendant at Lebanon Community Hospital said late tonight no change was reported in the condition of Edgar Howard Trolinger, Scio, who was critically injured last Sunday in a one-car highway accident. He is being treated for a basal skull fracture.

His accident was one in a chain of misfortune that has plagued his family for close to a year. A few weeks before his accident, Trolinger's father, James, suffered fatal injuries in a tractor accident on the family farm near Scio.

Last June the Trolingers' 15-month-old daughter was killed when run over by a backing oil truck at the home. A few weeks prior to that the family's barn burned.

Another link was a hip fracture sustained last year by a 14-year-old son. He was hospitalized for many months.

Lad Charged In Beer Theft

Alden Wilbur Ocean, 19, of 180 N. 23rd St., was arrested late Saturday night by city police on a charge of burglary not in a dwelling involving the theft of 133 cases of beer from the Gideon Stoltz Co., 400 N. Summer St., early Wednesday morning.

Ocean told officers in a statement he dumped all but three cases into Shelton's Ditch and that it took him between 65 to 70 trips to unload the beer from a truck.

Can't Blow Smoke Rings Through His Chest Now

DENVER, April 6 (U)—Surgeons have closed a 5-inch hole in the upper right side of John Paul Waller.

No longer can the 30-year-old Phoenix, Ariz., mechanic blow smoke rings through the hole. Its repair by a team of surgeons at National Jewish Hospital here assures Waller of a normal future.

The hole was the result of an emergency surgical procedure when he was 17. He had been partially invalidated since childhood with a congenital deformity of the bronchial tubes and esophagus.

The hole was cut in the side of his chest to allow drainage of abscesses which formed as a result of food spilling into the lungs from his defective esophagus.

"Doctors mostly just scratched their heads when they looked at that hole," Waller said. However, one of them referred him to the medical center here.

Three months ago the team of surgeons performed a seven-hour operation, removing Waller's damaged and useless right lung, adjusting bones to fill the space vacated by the lung and repairing the bronchial and esophageal tube. Finally, the hole was sewed up.

Doctors said only 40 per cent of patients usually survive the operation. Waller, who stands 5-foot-3 and weighs 104 pounds, stood the operation well.

He headed for Phoenix today to join his wife. They are expecting their first child in a few months.

Gas Container Clue in California Torch Murders

LOS ANGELES, April 6 (U)—A gas container and a service station attendant who may have filled it with gasoline were key targets today in the police investigation of a fire bombing that wiped out six lives.

The container held the gasoline that was used to transform a southside Los Angeles bar into a death chamber Thursday night in one of the biggest mass slayings in local history.

Four men have been booked on suspicion of murder, but all four deny any implication in the explosion.

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Man Dies in Close Race With Train

GREENWICH, Conn., April 6 (U)—John Tyares, 55, a New York contractor, was taking a short cut over a 70-foot long, double-track New Haven Railroad trestle today.

Beside him a freight train was moving. Behind him came the roar of a passenger train.

Unable to jump to the parallel track, Tyares began to run.

He was a foot from safety, observers said, when the passenger train struck him. He was hurled 30 feet to his death.

Service Held for Ex-Salem Man

Services were held Saturday in California for Richard Snook, former Salem resident who died unexpectedly in his sleep Wednesday at his home in Los Angeles.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Ruth King, Salem; brothers, Frank and Robert Snook, both of San Bernardino, Calif.; sister, Avis Squires, Salem and aunt, Elsie Snook, Salem.

Legislation Studied by OSEA Board

The 19-member board of directors of the Oregon State Employees Association met all day Saturday in Salem, and heard committee reports telling of gains toward higher wages and improved benefits for state workers.

Oregon House Bill 432, which the association has sponsored, was reported to have "met considerable legislative approval." The group promoted the bill after completing a survey of present state salaries, which showed that current salaries are "sub-standard."

According to the association, the bill "will put the state in healthy competition with industry by setting state salaries at the prevailing rates for comparable jobs."
