

State Department Fund Cut Too Deep, Sec. Dulles Says

WASHINGTON, April 7 (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles says the Eisenhower administration, when it took office in 1953, "probably cut too deep, certainly too rapidly" in funds for the State Department.

Four Die in Crash of Jet Bomber

HONOLULU, April 7 (AP)—A B47 jet bomber crashed today near Kaala Mountain and Pacific Air Force headquarters, and the four men aboard were killed.
The big jet burst into flames after crashing with an explosion that awakened residents of the Wahiawa area in northwest Oahu before dawn.
A crew of paratrooper medics climbed on foot to the crash scene about 50 feet from the pinnacles of Kaala Mountain, 4,946 feet high in the Waianae range back of Schofield Barracks. The section's cliffs were too steep and dangerous to attempt parachute drops or helicopter landings.
A Military Air Transport Service plane crashed on the peak in 1955, killing all 46 aboard.
An Air Force spokesman said the B47 was making an approach circle to land at Hickam Air Force Base when it crashed.
He said identity of the crash victims probably would be announced from Strategic Air Command headquarters in Omaha.

Slide Dumps Car, Two Die

NELSON, B.C., April 7 (CP)—A mudslide crashed down on the main highway late today and swept a car off the road and 300 feet down an embankment to railway tracks below. A husband and wife were killed and their son seriously injured.
The accident happened on the southern Trans-Provincial highway, 13 miles south of the southeastern British Columbia town.
Mr. and Mrs. Magnus Hillestad were killed. Their 24-year-old son, Maurice, was reported in fair condition in a hospital here after crawling from the crushed wreckage of the car.
The parents were returning to their home at Renata, B.C., 40 miles west of here, from a vacation. The son was reported driving them to Renata from Nelson, where he works when the mudslide occurred.
The car was dumped onto the Canadian Pacific Railway tracks and an eastbound passenger train was held up 40 minutes while the trainmen and residents of the area lifted the vehicle from the tracks.
The highway and tracks were cleared later and traffic resumed.

Falls Kills Young Seattle Hiker

SEATTLE, April 7 (AP)—Thomas Heaphy, 17, of (3878-44th Ave. N. E.) died tonight when he slipped on a wet rock while hiking with a companion near Snoqualmie Pass.
Deputies for Coroner John P. Brill said Heaphy fell about 100 feet onto rocks when he slipped while crossing a small section of Franklin Falls near the old Denny Creek Road. The youth was the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Heaphy.

French Fashion Expert 'Slave to U.S. Women'

CHICAGO, April 7 (AP)—Christian Dior, the fashion world's gift to women, arrived here today and forthrightly said that he's a slave to American women.
Dior is in Chicago as the guest of honor at a black-tie dinner Monday evening in a fashion tribute to him by Marshall Field and Co. It introduced his fashions 10 years ago.
"It is part of the international celebration of a decade of Dior's fashion dominance," said Harold J. Nutting, executive vice president of Field's.
"But I don't think I'm king of anything," said Dior during a news conference. "I am a slave to American women."
Dior says he has in turn liber-

ated women this season from the "must hemline." He calls his new hemline the "liberty line." It's anywhere between midcalf and the ankle, giving women a choice.
Tomorrow some 6,000 Chicago socialites will pay \$10 a plate to "adore Dior" and see the largest collection of Dior fashions ever assembled. Two of Dior's models, Alla de Dulmen and Renee Bretton, have been imported from France to help present the Dior spring 1957 collection, at the grand ballroom of the Conrad Hilton Hotel.

Proceeds of the formal dinner will go to furnish a lounge for the Art Institute's new Ferguson Building, now under construction.

Elaborating on the international situation, he told the lawmakers that:

Food Aid Assured Congressmen

Rep. Rooney (D-NY), chairman of the subcommittee, said he was "utterly amazed" at Dulles' fund request, which he figured was 44 million dollars bigger than last year's appropriation and would add 1,625 persons to the payroll.
Rooney said this would make State Department employment in Washington the biggest in history.
Dulles commented that if the budget were held to last year's level, he probably would have to come back to Congress later to ask for more money.

Rep. Cleveland (R-Ill.) suggested "an inept man" could best appreciate Dulles' request for a big increase in what some congressmen call the "house fund."

\$1,380,000 for "House Fund"

Dulles asked for \$1,380,000, compared with last year's \$227,000, for what the department terms "representation allowances" to U. S. diplomats for entertainment deemed helpful to their work.

The secretary said this request was "tremendously important" and would allow service by career officers who are not independently wealthy. He said the amount should be even bigger to permit appointment of career ambassadors to London, Paris and Rome.

The subcommittee went on to question other department witnesses for weeks about such requests:

1. A 50 per cent increase, to 20 million dollars, in funds for international educational exchanges, including bringing to this country for the first time 20 leaders and specialists from Yugoslavia.
2. \$400,000 to put up a new chancery building in Dublin, Ireland, over the objections of U. S. Ambassador William Howard Taft III. Taft didn't like the location but the department said the present chancery building is one of the poorest in the Foreign Service.

3. \$300,000 for "recreation facilities" such as a tennis court at Basra, Iraq, a clubhouse in Bel-

An overheated oil stove "was blamed for the blaze," which trapped the woman in a bedroom.
Her husband, Chester, 73, and a grandson, Melvin Lynn Robbins, 14, who were sleeping in another bedroom, managed to escape.
Robbins suffered burns and cuts when he broke a window at the back of the house in an attempt to rescue his wife. He was taken to St. Johns Hospital at Longview, Wash.

4. \$135,000 for American participation in the still-inoperative Suez Canal Users Assn. which Dulles proposed last fall as one step in tackling the Suez crisis.

Dulles told the group he believes "the only serious danger of war with the Soviet Union is a war which might come about through a miscalculation on their part."
"I think if we make our own position clear in advance so as to exclude that risk of miscalculation, then we do away with the greatest risk of war," he added.

Police Break Wage Riot In Argentina

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, April 7 (AP)—Federal police used tear gas today to break up a wage demonstration by striking city employees in the heart of the city.
The government then issued a decree putting the strikers under military control. Military court trials and harsh punishment were threatened for workers who do not show up at their jobs Monday.
In broadcasting the decree the government said the strike was "inspired by Communists for political goals" and was not for legitimate labor union purposes.
The strike began three days ago as a protest against rising living costs. The strikers said a 20 per cent wage increase granted recently is not enough.
When 2,000 strikers gathered in the Plaza de Mayo today, the police moved in with tear gas and dispersed them.

Portland Police On 2nd Vice Raid

PORTLAND, April 7 (AP)—Another vice raid early today led to the second arrest of David Nance, 55, in 24 hours.

He was among five persons arrested in a police raid on the Williams Avenue district early yesterday.

Another raid by city police early today resulted in charges of keeping a gambling house and illegal sale of liquor against Nance. He posted \$500 bond on each charge. These were the same charges he was arrested a yesterday in a raid at the same place.

Exiled Archbishop To Visit in Kenya, Then Go to Greece

ATHENS, Greece, April 7 (AP)—The Greek tanker carrying Archbishop Makarios of Cyprus away from exile in the Indian Ocean radioed today the archbishop intends to go to Nairobi, Kenya, before coming here.
This gave rise to reports that the archbishop intends to confer in Nairobi with Francis Noel Baker, Labor member of the British Parliament who has taken a pro-Greek attitude in the Cyprus dispute.
Archbishop Makarios, leader of Greek Cypriots who want the British island colony linked to Greece, was freed from 13 months of exile on the Seychelles on condition that he stay away from Cyprus. The tanker Olympic Thunderer will take him to Madagascar, from whence he will fly to Nairobi. He is due in Athens April 17.

Curry Actress From Italy Off For U.S. Debut

ROME, April 7 (AP)—Slinko Sofia Loren, concealed in a big fur coat, took off on her first trip to the United States today. She will star in two films for Paramount.

The curvy, 22-year-old Italian actress excitedly practiced her English on reporters at the airport.

"You thank they will understand?" she asked.
Reporters gallantly reassured her that her message would be understood.

Senate Demos Rally to Help for Poland Plans

WASHINGTON, April 7 (AP)—Senate Democrats rallied today behind the Eisenhower administration's offer of economic aid to Poland in the face of fresh Republican criticism of the project.

Unexpected backing for a proposed 75-million-dollar deal to let Poland have surplus farm commodities and loans for machinery came from Chairman Russell (D-Ga.) of the Senate Armed Services Committee.

Russell, who is not enthusiastic about continuing foreign economic aid, said in an interview he will back the proposal to give assistance to Poland "so long as it is done on our terms and not theirs."

"Poland offers some hope of advancing the cause of freedom," Russell said. "I am not one to say that we should not do business with them under present circumstances. But any business we do must be on the basis of mutual benefit."

The administration's offer to Poland drew fire yesterday from Sen. Bridges of New Hampshire, Chairman of the Senate GOP Policy Committee. Bridges lined up with Sen. Knowland of California, the Senate Republican leader, in opposing further negotiations with the Poles on the grounds that any aid they receive would benefit Russia, at least indirectly.

2 Motorcycle Riders Cited

Two motorcycleists were charged Sunday with reckless driving after Patrolman Malcolm Clarkson was led on a 70-mile-an-hour chase down the centerline of Highway 90E north of Salem, state police said.

Clarkson said he was unable to overtake the cycles in the eight miles from Brooks to Hayesville Junction because the machines squeezed between cars where he was held back by heavy Sunday afternoon traffic.

The riders were intercepted near Hayesville Junction with the aid of another police car called by radio.

Arrested were James LeRoy Allsup, Olympia, and William Richard Overbay, Elma, Wash. They each paid \$25 bail.

The chase was complicated by a report that a woman had been struck by a motorcycle. It turned out that the woman had fallen into a ditch beside the road as the cycles roared past, police said.

Pedro Cardinal Segura, Seville Archbishop, Dies

MADRID, Monday, April 8 (AP)—Pedro Cardinal Segura, 76, archbishop of Seville, died today after more than a year of ill health.
He had been suffering from a kidney disorder complicated by circulatory difficulties.
He was a cardinal since Dec. 19, 1957, and archbishop of Seville since Sept. 14, 1957.

The cardinal was laid until the end. A cardiac collapse, or heart failure, was given as the immediate cause of death.

The cardinal, for 20 years a Roman Catholic storm center in Spain, was administered extreme unction Saturday at his own request.

He received the apostolic blessing from Pope Pius XII by telegram.

Just a year ago the cardinal was gravely ill with uremia and a heart deficiency. Doctors attending him in Seville then had despaired of saving his life.

His death reduces the membership of the College of Cardinals to 58. When at full strength it numbers 70.

Washington Foundry Men Strike Today

TACOMA, April 7 (AP)—Members of the Molders and Foundry Workers' Union in Seattle, Tacoma and Everett rejected an offer of employers for a new contract and will start picketing plants tomorrow morning, a union official announced today.

William Finn, business representative of the union, said the vote was 608-47 for rejection of the offer which was practically the same as that made last week to the Machinists' Union. The Machinists struck last week.

Finn said pickets will be placed at the Pacific Car & Foundry Co. plant at Renton and at the Olympic and Washington Iron Works in Seattle tomorrow morning.

About 1,250 workers are in the three locals.

The Machinists union turned down the contract last week. The contract includes a 10 to 15 cent an hour raise this year and a cost-of-living increase of 10 cents more next April 1. Machinists originally asked for a 30-cent raise.

Other Seattle metal trades unions will join the strike tomorrow morning. A. F. O'Neill, business manager of Boilermakers' Union 194, said some 400 members of that union would strike at all metal plants tomorrow. And Automotive Machinists Union 280 at Seattle will strike at several plants, including the Washington Metal Trades Truck and Trailer Shop.

Union business agents will meet with the Seattle Metal Trades Council in the Labor Temple in Seattle tomorrow morning to discuss the strike situation.
