

U.S. Seeks New Arms Curb Efforts

WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP)—The United States called today for a continued "serious effort" in big power disarmament talks toward bringing the East-West atomic arms race under international control.

It said there should be a push toward initial agreement on "a first step" of disarmament.

The American statement, issued at the State Department following a meeting of top administration officials, referred to talks at London which have gone on without success so far. But recently the Russians have been reported showing more interest in getting an agreement.

The U. S. statement emphasized that part of the agreement would have to be "proper safeguards for inspection and control"—a long-standing American position.

Dulles, Stassen Agree
The statement was agreed on by Secretary of State Dulles and Harold Stassen, President Eisenhower's disarmament advisor and chief negotiator in the London talks.

It was presented as reflecting the views of today's meeting which also included Chairman Lewis Strauss of the Atomic Energy Commission, Director Allison Dulles of the Central Intelligence Agency and representatives of the Defense Department as well as other State Department officials.

Stassen had returned at midday on a flying trip from London for consultation here on the progress of the London talks. He called the talks "the most serious negotiations on the reduction and control of armaments that have ever been held" by the United Nations Disarmament Subcommittee.

Stassen Impressed
Other officials said this meant mainly that Stassen was deeply impressed by what they called the "constructive" attitude shown by the Soviet Union in the talk.

Other members of the five-power subcommittee besides the United States and Russia are Britain, France and Canada.

Dulles presided over the State Department meeting and the statement reported that Stassen "gave a briefing on the progress of the London session which began a month ago. Stassen will leave Washington Tuesday for resumption of the meeting in the British capital Wednesday following an Easter recess."

Topics discussed in the unusual Saturday conference at the State Department, the statement said, included "initial reductions of armaments and manpower on a reciprocal basis; arms inspection systems, both ground and air; the United States proposal for cutting off at a given date fissionable production for weapons purposes; and the exchange of lists of armaments and blueprints."

Asst. Secretary of State Andrew Berding, who released the statement, would not expand on any of these points. He said he could not go beyond the agreed statement.

PORTLAND, April 20 (AP)—A union leader and the president of the National Assn. of Manufacturers (NAM) will speak May 11 at the Oregon Young Democrats' convention in Albany.

Bishop, president of the Young Democratic Clubs of Oregon, said Gov. Robert Holmes also will be one of the speakers at the three-day convention that opens May 10.

Ingold was a seasonal agricultural worker until last year when his sight failed. He was blind at the time of his death.

The deceased was a member of First Methodist Church. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Mary I. Ingold, Salem, and a sister in Seattle, Wash.

SAGE Site Cost Listed At \$7 Million

ALBANY, April 20 — Hal Byer, manager of the Chamber of Commerce here, said he received word today from Rep. Walter Norblad that the SAGE radar installation to be erected at Camp Adair, about 25 miles southwest of Salem, will cost \$7 million.

Norblad said security precautions prevent the disclosing of details on the project or the names of contractors.

When completed the installation will be part of the early warning radar network which covers and surrounds the United States and Canada.

SAGE, Semi-Automatic Ground Environment, is an electronic brain which can detect a far-off aircraft and determine whether it is friendly. It flashes word to the nearest airbase if the plane is hostile and can also direct American aircraft to the enemy.

Tornadoes, Flash Floods Strike Texas

DALLAS, Tex., April 20 (AP)—Tornadoes, hail and flash floods caused by up to 5.70 inches of rain hit Texas today.

One twister flattened a number of buildings on a farm near Paducah. Another cut a swath around Brownfield. A third was spotted by an airplane pilot about 20 miles east of Spur.

A 4.70 inch rain in little over an hour flooded a residential section of Cotulla in south Texas tonight.

Deputy Sheriff C. D. Youngblood said some 50 to 75 families were evacuated from the Latin-American district along the banks of a creek. Most got out ahead of the water but a few had to be rescued by boat, Youngblood said.

Some 2,500 telephones were knocked out in Wichita Falls when water came in contact with a cable. The city had had 1.80 inches of rain by 10 p.m.

Highways near Vernon in west Texas were flooded and more than 50 cars were reported stranded on high spots. A number of south Texas highways also were closed.

Light to heavy hail pounded many points in the western half of Texas.

Afternoon cloudbursts totaled 5.70 inches at Paducah, about 110 miles west of Wichita Falls.
