

Legislature Aims to End In 4 Weeks

Now that the House taxation committee has announced its program, the Legislature thinks it can adjourn in about four more weeks. This program—which keeps personal income taxes at about the current level and boosts the taxes on corporations—is expected to get through the House with little trouble.

The stumbling block will be the Senate, where Republicans are taking pot shots at it. Some Democrats, especially those who want a 50 per cent increase in the basic school fund, are objecting that it won't raise enough money.

Of the 23 planks in Gov. Holmes' program, only two have been passed by both Houses. They ask Congress to build John Day dam, and set up a conciliation service to mediate labor disputes. Four other planks have died in the Senate. They would have asked Congress to build Hells Canyon dam, repealed the anti-picketing law, repealed the relative responsibility law, and abolished the State Fair Commission.

Eight others have been passed by one House. And 12 haven't been acted upon by either House. Here is the status of the major legislation.

Basic School Fund Increase—No action, but the Democrats are expected to vote to boost the fund from \$80 per child to \$90. The governor wants \$120.

Key district plan is redistribute the basic school fund—passed by the Senate. The House education committee expects to act on it early next week.

School Building Aid—Still in committee.

School District Reorganization—Passed by the House, now in the Senate education committee.

Teacher Minimum Salary Increase—In the House education committee after the Senate passed it.

Interim committee to study government reorganization—passed by the House, now in Senate committee.

Creating Lieutenant Governor—Passed by the House, should reach the Senate floor next week.

Abolishing Board of Control and Labor Commission—Action.

Abolishing Unemployment Compensation Commission—The Senate defeated it. It will vote next week on a substitute bill to provide separate commissions for the Unemployment Compensation and Industrial Accident Commissions, which are now run by a single commission.

Building Program—Totalling 20 million dollars, this probably will be considered after the rest of the department budgets are approved.

Unemployment Compensation Benefits Increase—No action, but the Senate labor and industries committee will meet Monday night and Tuesday as it.

Twenty Per Cent Industrial Accident Benefits Increase—The House passed it this week, and now it's in the Senate labor and industries committee.

Creating State Development Department—Approved by the joint ways and means committee.

Relative Responsibility Law—The Senate voted to reduce the required payments. Now the bill is in House committee.

Capital Punishment Repeal—Passed by the House, and the Senate state and federal affairs committee approved it Friday.

Legislation to give the public utilities commission authority over minimum railroad freight rates and reduction of rail passenger service—no action, but the Senate will vote on them next week.

Election Reform Bill—The House elections committee has this bill almost ready for House action.

Bonds to construct coast highway in Curry County—The Senate voted for it Friday and sent it to the House.

Suburban Problems—The Senate has voted to permit reduced city taxes in annexed areas, the House has voted for county home rule. The House voted against creating county service districts, reconsidered it, and now it's back in committee.

Requiring the governor to suspend indicted state and local officials—passed by the House, it's now resting in the Senate Multnomah delegation.

Rolling Vehicle Kills Motorist

CONNELL, Wash., April 20 (AP)—A rolling car threw LeRoy E. Roberts, 60, of Richland to his death near here early today on the start of a pleasure excursion through the Columbia Basin.

He was killed outright when the car in which he was a passenger left a county road on a downgrade curve about 30 miles north of Pasco.

Two of the three others in the car were injured. One of them was the driver, Mrs. Clyde Henson, 33 of Anahem, Calif. Her husband escaped injury.
