OTTAWA, April 20 (AP)—An eight-man Arctic expedition leaves next week to spend more than a year on North Ellesmere Island, within 550 miles of the geographic North Pole. The party will study geographical, geological and climatological conditions as part of Canada's contribution to the International Geophysical Year program.
