

Yanks, Bum Continue As Pace Setters

(Continued from preceding page) won its first of the new season, 7-3 over Cleveland, and Washington defeated Baltimore, 6-4 in other American League games. Rain stopped the Chicago Cubs and the Cardinals at St. Louis, limiting the remainder of the National League program to Philadelphia's 6-3 decision over the Giants at New York.

Duke Snider and Carl Furillo hit back-to-back home runs in the fourth inning off Bob Friend to give Podres all the batting support he needed. Young Johnny walked only two batters and struck out nine, getting Dale Long four times.

Crandall Hits Homer

A two-run triple by Bobby Thomson and Del Crandall's homer helped the Braves into a 5-1 lead which withstood a Red Sox rally featuring homers by Wally Post and George Crowe. Ray Crowe, with help from Red Murff, got the victory over Brooks Lawrence, Cincinnati's 19-game winner a year ago who lasted only an inning and gave up three runs. The Phils, winning their first game, built up a 6-1 lead over the Giants with Willie Jones hammering in four runs with a homer, single and sacrifice fly and Rookie Ed Bouchee adding the other two while collecting four hits, including his first Major League home run. A solo homer by Andre Rodgers and a three-run blast by Willie Mays made it close.

Red Sox Shell Larsen

The Yankees kept their record clean despite the flop by Don (perfect game) Larsen in his first appearance since his classic no-hitter against Brooklyn in the 1956 world series. Larsen, still employing his no-windup, gave up five hits and four runs in the 1 1/2 innings he lasted. Clutch hitting by Gil McDougald and Bill Skowron wiped out an early Boston lead and set the stage for Bauer's winning blow.

Catcher Sherm Lollar was a one-man wrecking crew for the White Sox, who were down 6-0 after two innings. The veteran smashed a two-run homer, a two-run double and drove in a fifth run with a sacrifice fly. Lary, Detroit's 21-game winner last season but a 2-1 loser to Kansas City in last Tuesday's opener, finally got some hitting support from the Tigers. They sprayed 13 hits, three apiece by Bill Tuttle and Frank House and a home run, Detroit's first, by Frank Bolling.

Baltimore and Connie Johnson led 4-1 over Washington until the Senators flexed their muscles in the seventh, scoring four times to take the lead. The big hit was a two-run double by pinch hitter Julio Becquer.

Indians Outstroke OSC in Crew Race

REDWOOD CITY, Calif., April 20 (AP)—Stanford crewmen won a two-length victory over Oregon State College today over 3,000 meters at the Redwood City yacht harbor.

Stanford's time was 6 minutes, 29 seconds. Oregon State was timed in 6:48.

The crews were even for a half mile. With about 3/4 of a mile to go Stanford pulled ahead half a length. While Stanford was steering 30 consistently, Oregon speeded up to 25, then 34 per minute but Stanford still drew ahead. Oregon State frosh, however, took a half length lead at the start and beat Stanford frosh a length in 6:48.5. Stanford frosh time was 6:22.5.

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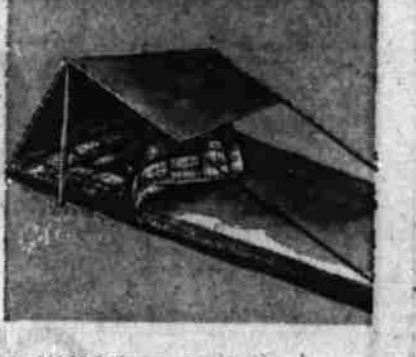
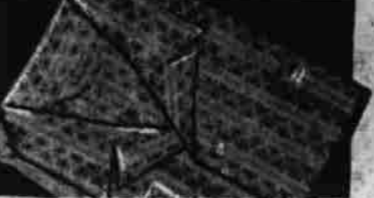
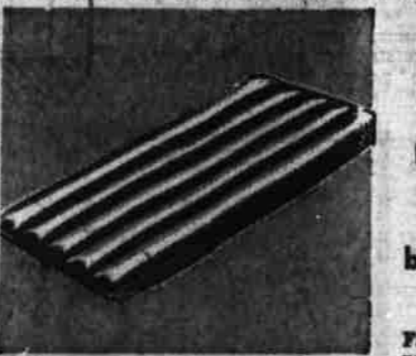
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
