Works presented to collector and home decorator alike include oils, watercolors, etchings, drawings, lithographs in black and white, reproductions in color and sculpture.

Boulter already is selecting for the opening show "the latest and finest works of Oregon artists who have been and are making a name for themselves in the art world. Several artists selected are from Salem whose names are to be announced later."
