JUDD PROMOTED

Marion county clerk Harlan Judd received a telegram Monday from Col. Murphy, commanding officer of the U. S. Army Camp Chaffee, Ark., promoting him from the rank of captain to major. The promotion is effective as of Jan. 5, 1946. Judd was elected county clerk Nov. 5, 1940, to take office in January of 1941 but was called into the army Dec. 6, 1940, and was released Dec. 6, 1941, one day before the Pearl Harbor attack. He was re-ordered into the army three months later on March 16, 1942, with the rank of second lieutenant in the ordnance department. He was re-elected county clerk while still in the army in 1944 and he returned to his duties at the clerk's office Nov. 19, 1945.
