Spaulding Stresses Need for Vet Housing, Aid in Radio Talk

An immediate program by the federal government to assist in producing more housing and for financial assistance in building houses for returned veterans, was stressed by Bruce Spaulding, Salem attorney and candidate for representative in congress from the first Oregon congressional district at Friday's special election, in a radio address here Tuesday night.

"For those unfortunate veterans for whom the war will never end, there must be provided the finest hospitalization with every possible comfort," Spaulding said.

Spaulding also emphasized the necessity for flood control in the Willamette valley and promised his support to this project provided he is successful at the polls.

PORTLAND, Jan. 8.—(AP) A national employment officer for the American Legion today proposed communities throughout Oregon form jobs-for-veterans committees.

Ralph H. Lavers, Washington, D.C., told Oregon Legionnaires 61 per cent of all servicemen have never held jobs in civilian life, having been drafted soon after leaving high school and from colleges.

He urged American Legion posts in Oregon to take the leadership in forming committees in each community to determine how many jobs were available now and may soon be available.
