Average Age of Juvenile Crime Shows Rise

The average age of Salem juvenile delinquents has taken an abrupt rise since the war's end, according to Fred Beck, city juvenile officer. Beck had no reasons to give for the rise except to suggest that more parents may be staying home now. The December report shows no offender under 13. Previously many had been

younger than that, he said. Statistics show: Automobile, 10 cases; break and enter, 1; larceny, 6; drunkenness or liquor involved, 6; vandalism, 2; sex or delinquency, 2; carelessness or mischief, 2; parole violation, 1; traffic violations, 4; neglected children, 1; runaway or missing girls, 4; girls returned, 4; runaway or missing boys, 22; boys returned, 22; curfew violations, first offense, 34; second offense, 1; cases investigated but not listed above, 10; following up old cases, 12; conferences or meetings with juvenile officer, 10; cases outside city, 26; total cases of individuals from daily register, 85.
