Agent Tells Lions, Dairymen Of Argentine Dairy Farms

Down in Argentina, where beef is king, cattlemen are interested in buying only the best breeding stock, either for beef production or for the dairying industry, which is still in its infancy. S. B. Hall, Multnomah county agent, told the Salem Lions club Thursday noon.

Hall addressed the club and approximately 80 visiting dairymen here for the convention of their state association who had been invited to join the service club for the luncheon meeting at the Marion hotel.

Served As Judge

In 1944 and again in 1945 the Multnomah county agent, who will have served in that office 30 years on January 15, went to Argentina to serve as a judge at that nation's biggest Holstein show.

Almost religiously, Argentine dairymen milk their cows once a day under primitive conditions, Hall declared, describing the system in operation at a dairy farm where 18,000 cows give milk to help supply the city of Buenos Aires.

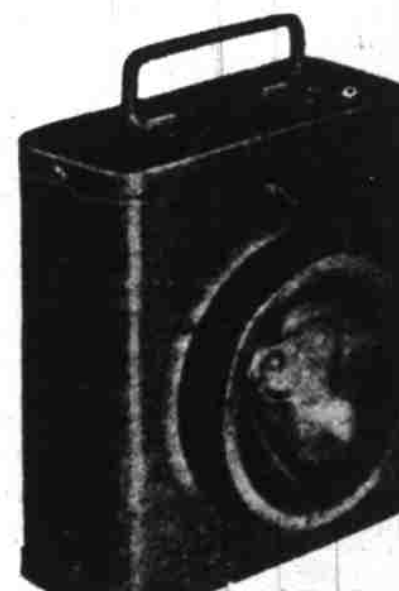

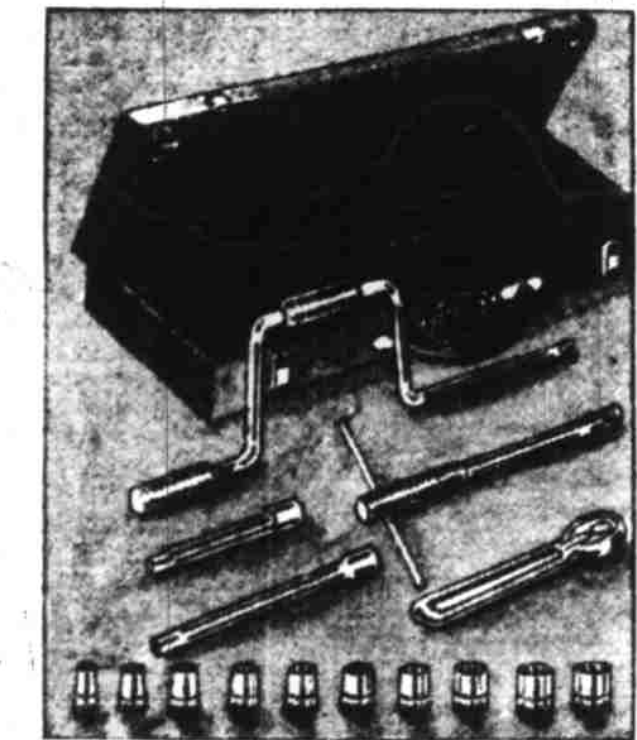

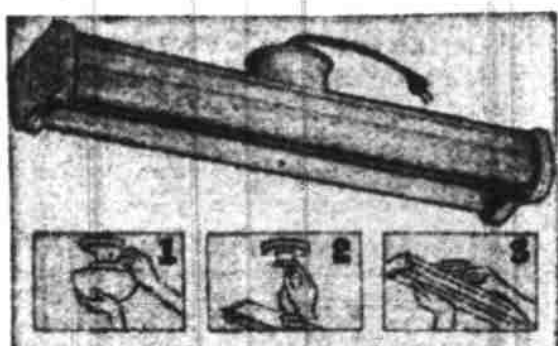
