

2 Boys Admit 20 Burglaries In, Near Salem

Two juveniles have admitted about 20 burglaries in Salem and vicinity since last June according to local police who arrested them Wednesday night, on a traffic charge. The boys were turned over to juvenile authorities Thursday.

An officer who stopped them noticed an electric drill in the car which he recognized as stolen, and further questioning led to confessions by two of the three boys in the car, police said.

The list of places the boys are said to have admitted burglarizing included the Salem high school, Firestone stores, McKay Chevrolet Co., Allen Hardware Co., Fred Meyer, Western Auto Supply Co., Coast to Coast stores, Stevens Jewelry store, Brown Jewelry store, Bishop's store and Marshall Wells store.

Rye Futures Drop 5 Cents

CHICAGO, Jan. 10 (AP)—Extensive profit taking and other liquidation set rye futures prices back around 5 cents a bushel from the high times today after the heaviest flurry of trading in several sessions.

Brokers bid the grain up as much as 2 1/2 cents in initial dealings following reports that eastern sources were predicting the May delivery might go to \$2.25 a bushel or higher. Recent quotations have ranged between \$1.77 and \$1.80.

Wheat closed 1/4 cent lower to 1/4 cent higher than the previous finish, May \$1.80 1/2; corn unchanged at \$1.18 1/2; oats 1/4 higher to 1/4 lower, May 76 1/2; rye unchanged to 1/4 lower, May \$1.77 1/2; barley unchanged to 1/4 higher, May \$1.22 1/2.

Stock Market Tops 15-Year Average High

NEW YORK, Jan. 10 (AP)—The stock market made a new 15-year average high today but profit cashing on the recent strong upswing put a number of rails and industrials in the losing ranks.

Activity of low-quoted utilities helped expand volume to 2,470,000 shares against yesterday's 2,

920,000 which was the second largest since May 21, 1940. Closing gains of fractions to 3 points were in the majority with wide jumps in evidence.

Demand still was attributed mainly to inflation hedging based on the administration's move to hoist prices for steel and other goods in an effort to settle mounting strikes and wage disputes.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up 5 of a point at 77.9, a peak since March 28, 1931. The industrials rose 9 at 103.4, best level since Sept. 11, 1930 while the utilities were up .3 at

Department Delays Hearing

Because canners were in convention at Gearhart and unable Wednesday to attend the hearing relating to grades for fresh cherries, the state department of agriculture adjourned the hearing until 1:30 p. m. Wednesday, January 16. It will be resumed in the department's branch office in the Oregon building, Portland.

The hearing was called at the request of Wasco county growers, who want permanent grades established for fresh cherries for bringing and for cherries for canning. The discussions on permanent grades, which will be on a permissive basis if established, will be based on the temporary grades in effect in 1945.

Growers as well as canners and briners are urged to attend the adjourned hearing next Wednesday.
