CHOCOLATE SOUFFLE
1 square chocolate
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 cup milk
3 tablespoons powdered sugar
2 egg yolks
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
2 egg whites
Granulated sugar
Melt chocolate over hot water. Melt butter in saucepan and add flour. Mix well and add milk gradually, stirring until mixture is smooth. Add powdered sugar and stir over heat until mixture begins to boil. Remove from heat and add egg yolks which have been beaten until light, and the melted chocolate. Cool, flavor with vanilla and fold in egg whites which have been beaten until stiff but still moist. Turn into greased baking dish which has been sprinkled with granulated sugar. Bake at 400 degrees 10 to 15 minutes. Serve immediately after taking from the oven with foamy sauce.
