Hawaiian Hope For Statehood Given Boost

WAILUKU, Maui, T.H., Jan. 12-(AP)—Members of the house territories subcommittee boosted Hawaiian hopes for statehood today with strong endorsements of the islands' fitness for that responsibility. At the end of the subcommittee's first week of hearings Rep. Henry D. Larcade, Jr. (D-La.), told Maui county officials last night that Hawaii "is just as ready for statehood as any of the states now in the union." Larcade said he was far more impressed with what he found on the islands than what a similar committee of which he was a member found in Alaska a year ago. Rep. Homer Angell (R-Ore.), said he hoped the island would "soon assume an outstanding place in the union of states," and Rep. James J. Delaney (D-NY) addressed a group as "citizens of the 49th state."

Mrs. Douglas Dies At Local Hospital

Mrs. Cora A. Douglas, 65, resident of Salem since 1925, died at a local hospital Saturday night. She was born in Ada, Ohio in 1880 and was a member of the Calvary Baptist church. 6-Man Military Junta Formed To Rule Haiti

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti, Jan. 12-(AP)—The military junta tonight formed a six-man military cabinet to rule Haiti after four more persons had been killed in another day of the disorders which brought about the ouster of President Elie Lescot. The death toll since the uprising began a week ago was estimated at 25. Mobs sacked and fired homes, stores and factories of Lescot supporters during the day while light tanks and armored scout cars patrolled the city attempting to restore order. The four were killed in a melee when a crowd broke into a jewelry store, smashed showcases and carried off loot.

The three-man junta decided to form the cabinet after a lengthy consultation with numerous political factions seeking posts in the government. A decree issued shortly afterwards said the multiplicity of parties made the formation of a national union cabinet "impossible" at this time.

Banquet Honors Ted R. Gamble

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 12-(AP)—Robert W. Coyne, Washington, D. C., assistant national director of the war finance division, declared here that working with Portland's Ted R. Gamble was like being "second man to a buzzsaw." He addressed a banquet at which Gamble received the award as 1945 "first citizen" last night. Other speakers were Governor Snell, Mayor Riley, and civic leaders.

Portland Army Air Base Plan Not Permanent

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 12-(AP)—Portland army air base will not be a permanent major facility, headquarters of the 4th air force reported today. Earlier, Brig. Gen. E. Moore, 4th air force chief of staff, in an interview at Portland, said the army would take title to the field and develop it further. The headquarters today said Gen. Moore had presented the war department plan which he believed current but which had been changed without 4th air force knowledge. Officials reported Portland had been taken from the list of permanent bases and through oversight or delay 4th air force was not notified. All decisions on bases are by the war department.

CHUNGKING, Sunday, Jan. 13-(AP)—Orders to cease fire by midnight tonight were sped to the troubled spots of China and the effect became apparent at once in the north areas where Chinese communists have opposed advances of government troops.

690 Tons Hop Wire Available

Six hundred and ninety tons of hop wire have been located and made available for hop growers of the Willamette area damaged by the recent flood. The wire, fence and other requirements will be made available through local retailers who receive stocks from the supply houses, the Salem office of the American Red Cross announced Saturday.

The hop wire was allocated by the civilian production administration through the San Francisco office of the Red Cross, following an appeal made by Judge George Rossman, chairman of the Marion county chapter of the Red Cross.

3-Day Lockout In Argentina

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 12-(AP)—A complete shutdown of all commerce and industry in Argentina for three days beginning Sunday midnight as announced by the permanent committee of manufacturers, industrialists and businessmen today in protest against the government's bonus and wage increase decree.

The announcement came after a cabinet meeting presided over by President Gen. Edelmiro Farrell postponed consideration of the employers' demand for a substantial modification of the decree, issued Dec. 20, ordering Christmas bonuses and pay increases, amounting generally to 25 per cent of pay rolls to all workers in the country.

Biological Danger Seen in Atom Force

LONDON, Jan. 12-(AP)—The development of atomic energy is "fraught with biological danger" because its radio active forces destroy male potency, a British biologist said today. Dr. Kenneth Wakler, author of many books on male infertility, asserted that radio active forces are "known to have a profound influence on living tissues and more particularly on the cells responsible for continuation of the race." He advocated immediate research to protect the male power of fatherhood.

Reorganization of Nip Cabinet Ended

TOKYO, Jan. 12-(AP)—The storm tossed Shidehara cabinet, lightened by the resignation of five ministers and a deputy cabinet secretary, completed its reorganization tonight.

The six officials who walked the political plank in obedience to General MacArthur's directive purging ultra-nationalists from the government were replaced by new men, and the mended cabinet awaited only the return of ailing Premier Kijuro Shidehara to resume its delicate task of governing under foreign control.
