PORTLAND, Jan. 15 (AP)—A proposal that the state legislature and the board of higher education establish a \$100,000 annual research fund for the federal-state seed testing laboratory at Oregon State college was before the Oregon Seed Growers' league today.

Dr. Don D. Hill of OSC, speaking at the growers' opening session, said the lab needs more technicians and more space.

A department of agriculture official, Harry A. Schoth of Corvallis, urged Oregon farmers to spur their leadership in the seed industry by developing foundation stock, continued certification, new crops with higher yields, control of insects and diseases.

## Truman Plans Joint Message For Congress

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—President Truman announced to a surprised news conference today that he is combining his messages on the state of the union and the budget and will send the one document to congress on Monday.

The White House previously had said that the state of the union message would be sent to the capitol on Thursday. Reporters who pressed Mr. Truman as to the reason for the change in plans got only the statement that he had concluded, after a great deal of study, that one message would serve just as well as two.

The president was asked whether the strike situation had contributed to his decision. He said it had not.

In reply to another question, the chief executive said he will send a separate message to congress asking approval of the proposed \$3,750,000 loan to Britain some time after his Monday message.
