At Linn Union

State President Tells Of Farm Threat by Cabinet Member

The Linn county Farmers Union held its quarterly meeting at Oakville Saturday. Mrs. Laura Neal of Jordan was elected president of Linn county Farmers Union to succeed A. C. Heyman who wished to retire. The Linn county organization thus becomes the second in Oregon to elect a woman as its presiding officer. Mrs. John Krivanek heads the Columbia county organization.

W. W. Abraham of Oakville was elected vice president, following a run-off vote when he and Frank Perry of Riverview tied for this office.

W. E. Myers, Santiam Central local, was selected secretary-treasurer. The new executive committee consists of Harry E. Mullen of Santiam Central, Pat Gorman, Jordan and Frank Perry.

Resolutions were adopted attacking the poll tax and calling for its abolition; favoring the fair employment practices bill, now in a senate committee; favoring the continuation of ceiling price controls for at least another year; favoring the CVA and the development of the Willamette Valley project.

Former governor Walter M. Pierce talked on the utility question and urged the voters of Linn county to approve the PUD when it is voted on next May.

Ronald E. Jones, state president, told the crowd that the biggest threat farmers now face is controlled production of farm products which Secretary of Agriculture Anderson is advocating.

"Agriculture is on a full production program," he said, "but all other parts of the economy are on a scarcity program."

Harley Libby told of the proposed health center at Salem, stressing the fact that it contemplated the prevention of disease as well as the cure and treatment.

"If we don't plan a health program and do it for ourselves, then the government will have to do it for us," he declared.

Arthur H. Bone talked on the menace of monopoly and the fight international cartels were making on the people's movement around the world.


