Map-Making Topic of Rotary Club Address

The mechanics of map making for the military forces was the topic of a talk by Dr. W. D. Wilkinson, department of geology, Oregon State college, Wednesday noon at Salem Rotary club. Material on which to print the maps so they stand rough handling was only one of the problems discussed. Samples of the material finally selected as well as a captured German map were displayed. 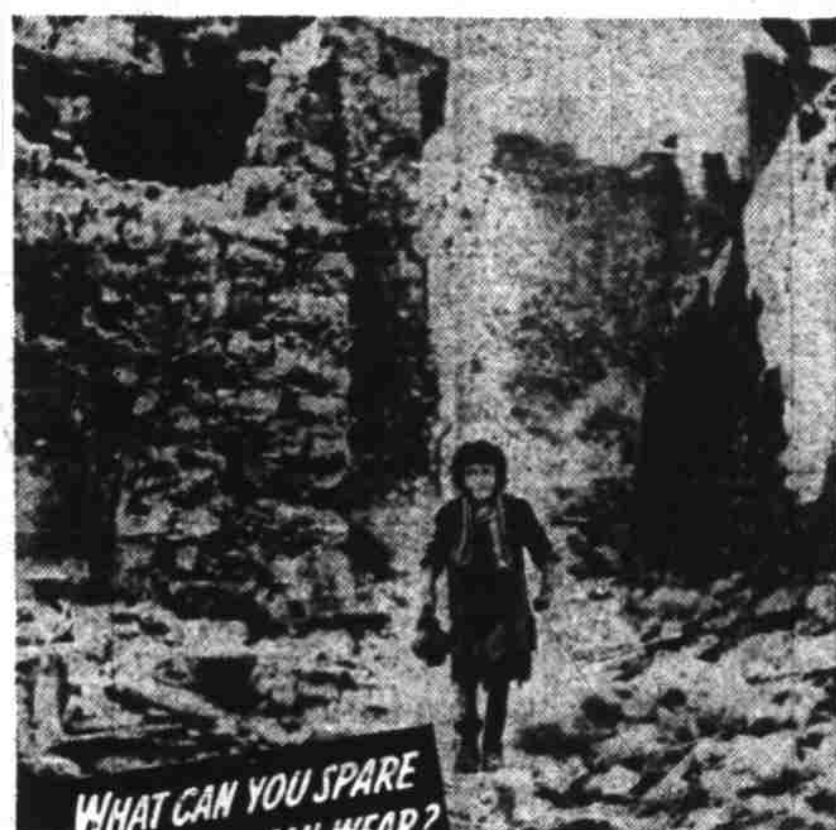

Willamette to Play Host to Speech Contest

Willamette university will be host to the 12th annual Oregon High School Speech contest March 15 and 16. Dr. Herbert E. Rahe, director of drama, announced this week. Open to any high school student who has been selected by a teacher or instructor the event may be entered by any number of contestants. There are five contests: 1. Oratory, 2. extemporaneous speaking, 3. serious interpretation, 4. humorous interpretation, and 5. debate; each being judged on originality, theory, and presentation. An inter-collegiate contest for men and women will be offered this year for the first time. It will be held the evening of March 15, and special awards will be given to the winners.

The following high schools have won permanent possession of a school trophy by winning two times: Debate, Salem; extemporaneous speaking, Forest Grove, Medford and Beaverton; serious interpretation, Dallas, Franklin and Salem; humorous interpretation, Franklin and Salem; and oratory, Beaverton.

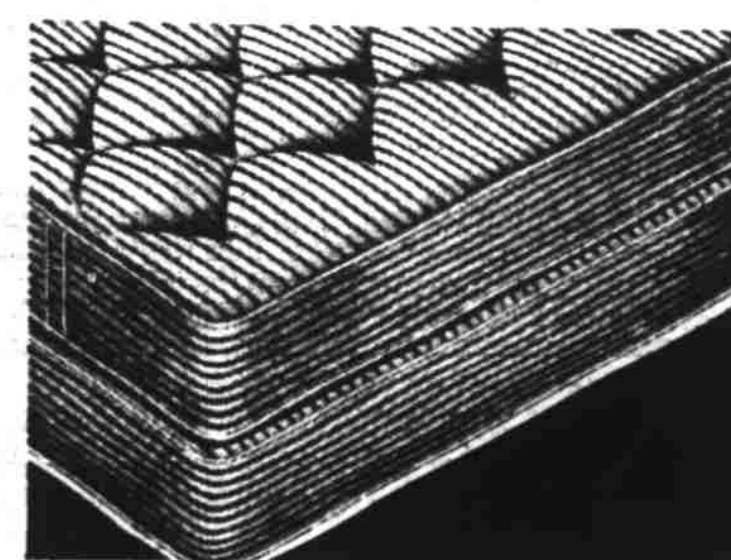

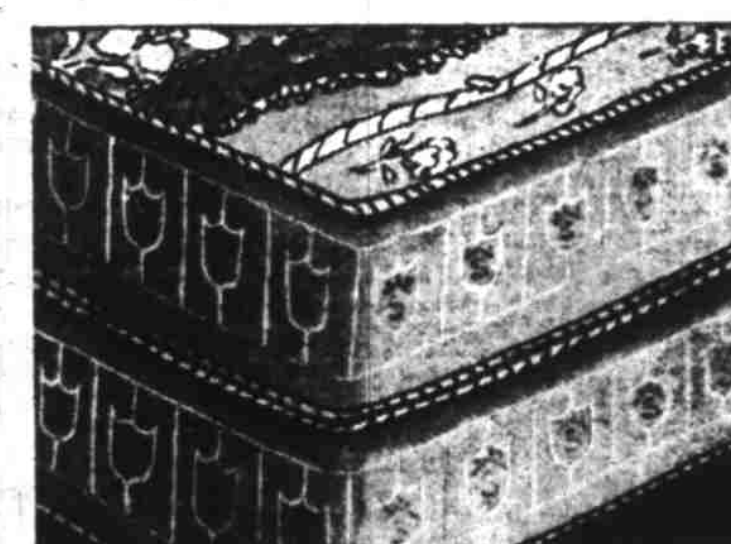
