Whole Menus, Frozen and Ready to Heat Are Predicted on Way Soon

Frozen foods are popular—and somebody is making something of it.

Just within the past few months, this type food has taken a big turn for the better. There are bigger and better cases showing in the stores and there are more and larger assortments of food available.

Only a few years ago, eight or so at the very most, people looked upon preservation of frozen foods for home use as a novelty, and only the most modern housewives were doing it. It took a few years for the food to come into the market commercially, so one could buy berries, fruit or vegetables by the pound. I remember that within only the past very few years we were doing more than hear remotely of "frozen fillets of cod" which are now available almost everywhere.

Pre-cooked frozen foods are the latest development and are becoming of real commercial importance. Right now it's possible to buy cooked baked beans, chicken a la king and a few others. Now we hear predicted the coming of complete meals, put up in paper, ready to heat and complete with meat, baked goods and even dessert.

The business woman will pause briefly in her other evening chores to set the frozen dinner on the stove, and a few minutes later, on the table. She'll merely pick up the paper containers in which packed, cooked and eaten, and whisk the remains of the meal into the garbage can.

Even now several large east-end concerns are turning to frozen food preparation for airplane travelers. Plans are to put up the dishes which will be heated in an electronic cooker in the plane.
