PORTLAND, Jan. 17. —(P)—An inquiry from a possible purchaser of Portland Traction company and interurban railway properties of Portland Electric Power company was reported today by trustees of the firm.

The trustees filed in federal court a letter to the representative of Pacific Cities Lines, Inc., Oakland, Calif., in which they suggested he put in definite form an offer apparently made in earlier correspondence.

The trustees indicated that several inquiries had been received relative to sale of the properties valued at \$7,500,000. The securities and exchange commission has approved a reorganization plan for PEPCO in which the sale is contemplated.
