Fish Sauces May Be Varied For Family Taste; Get 'em From Books

What's sauce for the good is not necessarily sauce for the salmon—but most families demand some accompaniment for the fish course and the wise woman varies her fare.
White sauce, tartar sauce, hot mayonnaise, hollandaise sauce, or drawn butter, are familiar on the menus that include fish.
Woman find cream sauce with a few slices of hard cooked egg a good topping for salt fish especially. Use a regular cream sauce, or add a generous dash of

paprika and a little onion and even some dry mustard. Some women add browned nuts to their white sauce to pour over fish. A white sauce with celery added also makes a good fish topping.

Another much appreciated variation of white sauce when used on fish, is cheese sauce made by grating some cheese into the prepared dish. A teaspoon of curry powder added to the white sauce makes another flavor.

A hot tartar sauce can be made by mixing $\frac{1}{2}$ cup white sauce with $\frac{1}{2}$ cup mayonnaise, small onion chopped, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon vinegar and some pickles, olives and parsley.

Bread sauce is so old fashioned many of us have almost forgotten it.

BREAD SAUCE

$\frac{1}{2}$ cup stale breadcrumbs (fine)
2 cups milk
1 onion, chopped
Cloves
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt
Few grains cayenne
3 tablespoons butter
Coarse breadcrumbs

Add crumbs and onion to milk in double boiler, let cook half hour, add butter and seasonings and put on fish. Sprinkle with coarse crumbs. This is a good sauce for cauliflower or broccoli. Creole sauce is excellent on
