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Linn County Livestock Group Advocates Removal of Tariff

ALBANY, Jan. 18 (Special)—Removal of tariff on livestock was opposed by the Linn County Livestock association which held its annual meeting Friday at Albany. The group passed a resolution to this effect which will be sent to Oregon congressmen.

The Linn county group also passed a resolution asking that the state veterinarian's office continue its first practice of issuing health certificates for livestock shipped out of the state.

The Friday program was an innovation in that most of the speakers were farmers from the county who told of successful practices they made on their ranches. Albert Julian, president, opened the meeting. R. C. Burkhardt, Lebanon, president of the Western Oregon Livestock association, told of its progress. H. A. Lindgren, extension animal husbandry man from Corvallis, spoke on the livestock situation and outlook.

Others were L. M. Cheney and Francis Williams, who reported on trapping programs; John Silbernagel, Scio, speaking on seedling cut-over timber lands; Clay Nichols, Lebanon, subterranean clover and alta fescue for beef cattle; Hubert Willoughby, Harrisburg, beef cattle on irrigated pastures and feeding lambs.

Expediter to Aids Vets First

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 - (AP) Wilson W. Wyatt, federal housing expediter, said last night that war veterans are not only "entitled to first claim on the new houses and apartments—they are also entitled to first claim on the vacancies as they occur."

Reviewing the current housing shortage, Wyatt said on a CBS broadcast program:

"Many of you who are not veterans, would like to buy a new home, or rent an apartment. But I am sure that you will agree that the veteran is entitled to first consideration."

"This will be but a meager payment on the debt we owe to the men who have served in our armed services."

Schools Face Subsidy Drop

Elimination on July 1 of so-called Lamham federal funds, for the support of school districts, will prove a hard blow to many Oregon school districts which are still inhabited by a large number of former war workers, Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, declared here Friday.

Putnam said the Portland school district had received approximately \$1,000,000 of these funds annually for several years while the Vanport school district received \$750,000. No state funds, other than those previously provided, will be available for the financial assistance of these districts now receiving federal aid.
