Fast Moving Session Hits Stock Market

NEW YORK, Jan. 18. (AP)—Rallies and relapses hit the stock market today in the fastest session for more than five years as investors attempted to figure out important shifts in the news.

The boost of margins to 100 per cent was taken in stride by the list, but heavy selling followed US Steel's rejection of the wage compromise proposal of President Truman in his efforts to avert a strike.

The ticker tape was late for a brief interval in the first hour as trends recovered from an early dip. Steels led the comeback. In the afternoon sell-off the tape again fell as much as three minutes behind floor transactions, but soon caught up, and many comebacks eventuated in the final quarter hour. Low-quoted utilities especially were favored, along with scattered specialties. Even steels regained some of their equilibrium. Casualties of fractions to 4 points, however, were plentiful at the close.

Transfers totaled 3,230,000 shares, compared with 2,200,000 Thursday, and were the largest since May 21, 1940.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was off 3.4 of a point at 79.2. The industrial average was down .6. It was another broad market, 1029 issues appearing. Of these, 472 declined, 371 advanced and 186 were unchanged.

New High Set In Canned Milk

A new Oregon record in production of canned evaporated milk was set in the first half of 1945, when 25,000,000 pounds were handled, according to a report on dairy products just compiled by the federal and state departments of agriculture.

Also reported for the same period were substantial increases in cheddar and cream cheese output and a 20 per cent drop in creamery butter production in comparison with butter figures for the first half of 1944.

Butter output in the first half of 1945 was 10,445,000 pounds; cheddar cheese production was 13,885,000 pounds from whole milk and 223,000 pounds from part-skim milk. Total make of cream, cottage and other cheeses was over a million pounds greater than in the first half of 1944.

Sizable gains were made in the output of condensed milks and in dry whole milk while drops were recorded in non-fat dry milk solids and other dried products except whole milk.

Although there was a decrease of only 1.4 per cent in the total milk and cream received at dairy manufacturing plants, there was a large drop (from 17,507 in the first half of 1944 to 13,890 in the average number of patrons delivering cream to Oregon plants. The number delivering whole milk was down slightly and averaged 11,070 patrons.

Systematic control of cherry fruit fly, which caused considerable loss to growers last year, is being planned by the state department of agriculture. Department officials now are drawing orders creating three control districts, one in Hood River county, one in Wasco, and the other combining Marion, Linn, Polk and Yamhill counties. The action follows hearings in Salem and five other cities of the cherry areas, where growers voiced their approval.

Under the control order, all cherry trees throughout the area must be sprayed or dusted at proper intervals to keep down the fruit fly.

The order will list several optional formulas which growers may use in compliance. Details will be released later in the counties primarily interested, and anyone interested may obtain a complete copy of the order by writing to the division of plant industry, state department of agriculture, Salem.

Grain Futures Score Gains

CHICAGO, Jan. 18. (AP)—Grain futures prices scored their broadest gains in many weeks today, with May rye advancing the full 5 cents permitted in one trading session to a new 25-year peak at \$1.98 1/2 a bushel.

Both the July and December wheat deliveries and the May and December oats deliveries also chalked up new seasonal top prices. Wheat closed unchanged to 1 1/2 cents above the previous finish. May 1.80 1/2; corn unchanged at \$1.18 1/2; ceilings; oats 1 1/2 to 2 1/4 up, May 80-80 1/2; rye unchanged to 5 cents up, May 1.98 1/2; barley unchanged to \$1.22 1/2.

Nips Ordered Food Withheld from POWs

YOKOHAMA, Friday, Jan. 18. (AP)—Lt. Col. Shigeo Emoto, overall commander of prison camps in the Hakodate area of Hokkaido testified today that he heard a high Japanese officer order Kaiichi Hirata, a camp commandant, to withhold food from prisoners in the guardhouse "to make their punishment more effective."

Hirata, commander of the Muroran camp, is on trial for his life, charged with responsibility for deaths of four allied prisoners.
