First 2 Days Net Ten Tons Of Old Clothes

More than 10 tons of used clothing were collected from Salem schools, fire stations and other collection depots throughout the city Friday and Saturday by volunteer workers in the clothing drive.

Among city schools Englewood contributed the heaviest load of clothing, according to Floyd Seamster, drive packing and shipping chairman. McKinley school gave the second greatest amount and Sacred Heart academy contributed the third largest load, he said.

"We have collected much more clothing than we expected," said Seamster. "It is all in good shape and I am sure that we will more than pass last year's score of 30 tons," he added.

Already one truck load of clothing has been packed and shipped to the Portland procurement division. When more space is available in the R. L. Elfstrom warehouse, where the clothing is now packed for shipment, collecting from rural schools will begin, Seamster said.

Thirty trucks will accompany 200 Boy Scouts in their tour of the 7000 Salem homes today from 12:30 to 5 o'clock. The scouts are asking contributors to have their bundles or boxes of clothing on their curbs by 12:30 today.

Seek Changes In Land Grant Distributions

A report on proposed amendments to federal statutes covering distribution of proceeds from grant lands highlighted the meeting of representatives of Oregon and California land grant counties in Portland Friday.

County Judge Grant Murphy, who attended the meeting, stated that proposed amendments are being brought up by lumber and county governmental interests.

The bill now prepared would provide that 10 per cent of the gross receipts go toward reforestation and fire patrol of the lands; 45 per cent to the counties, instead of 50 per cent in the present law; 22½ per cent for administration purposes and another 22½ per cent for liquidation purposes, instead of the 25 per cent for each of these departments as is provided for in the present law.

'Gen. Joan of Arc' To Speak at Elks Temple on Jan. 31

Julia de la Calzada Peters, whose three years of jungle fighting and spy work won her the title of "General Joan of Arc," will speak on the Ladies' night program of the Elks' club Thursday, January 31, club officials have announced.

The young woman, daughter of wealthy Manila parents, eloped with an American mining engineer named Chester Peters when she was 21 years old -- in 1940. In 1942, when the Japanese overran Leyte she and her husband

fled to the hills. The former was badly wounded and subsequently evacuated by submarine to Australia. His wife joined the American guerilla forces on Mindanao. Her experiences, including capture, are declared to constitute one of the outstanding sagas of the war.
