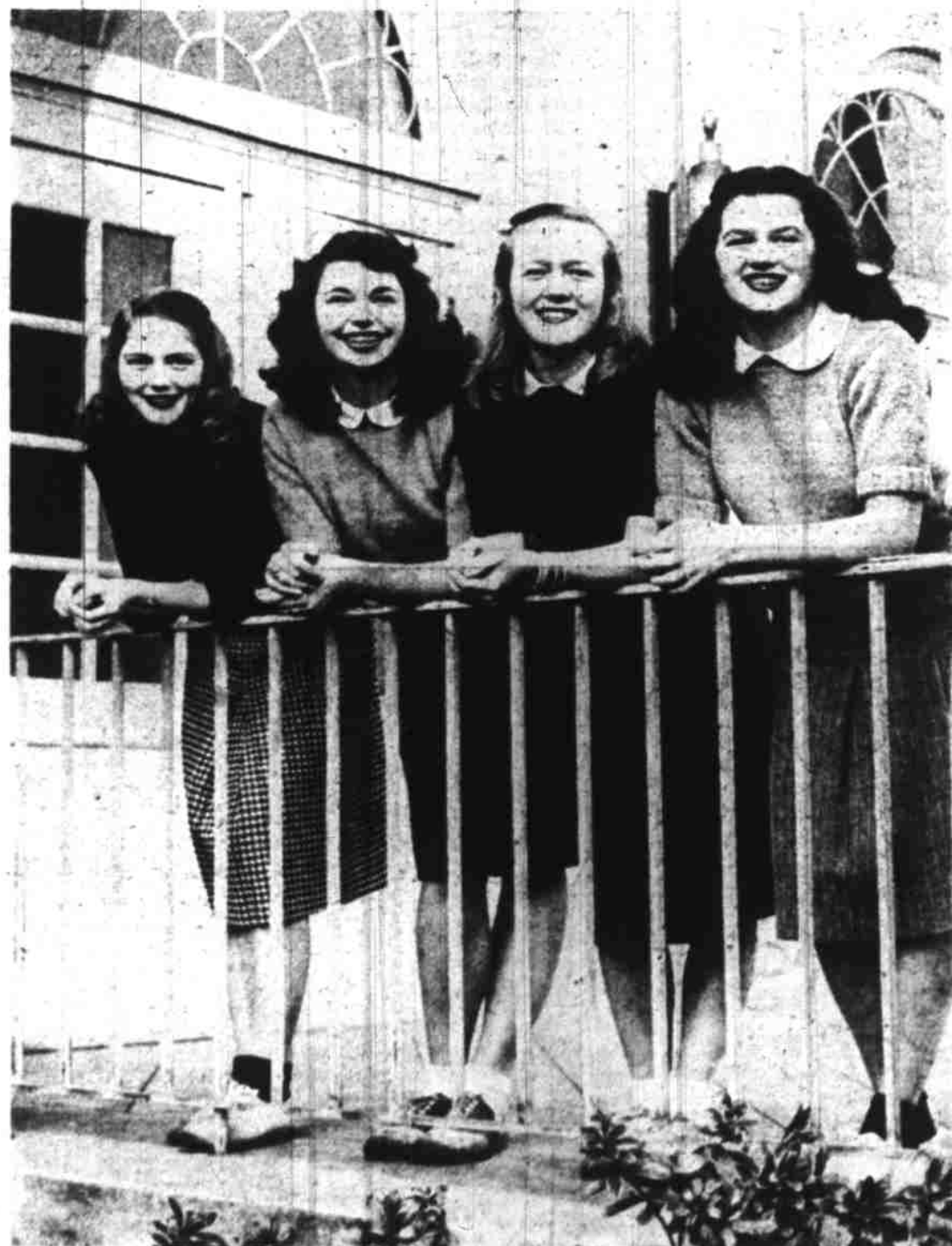
Visit in Bay City

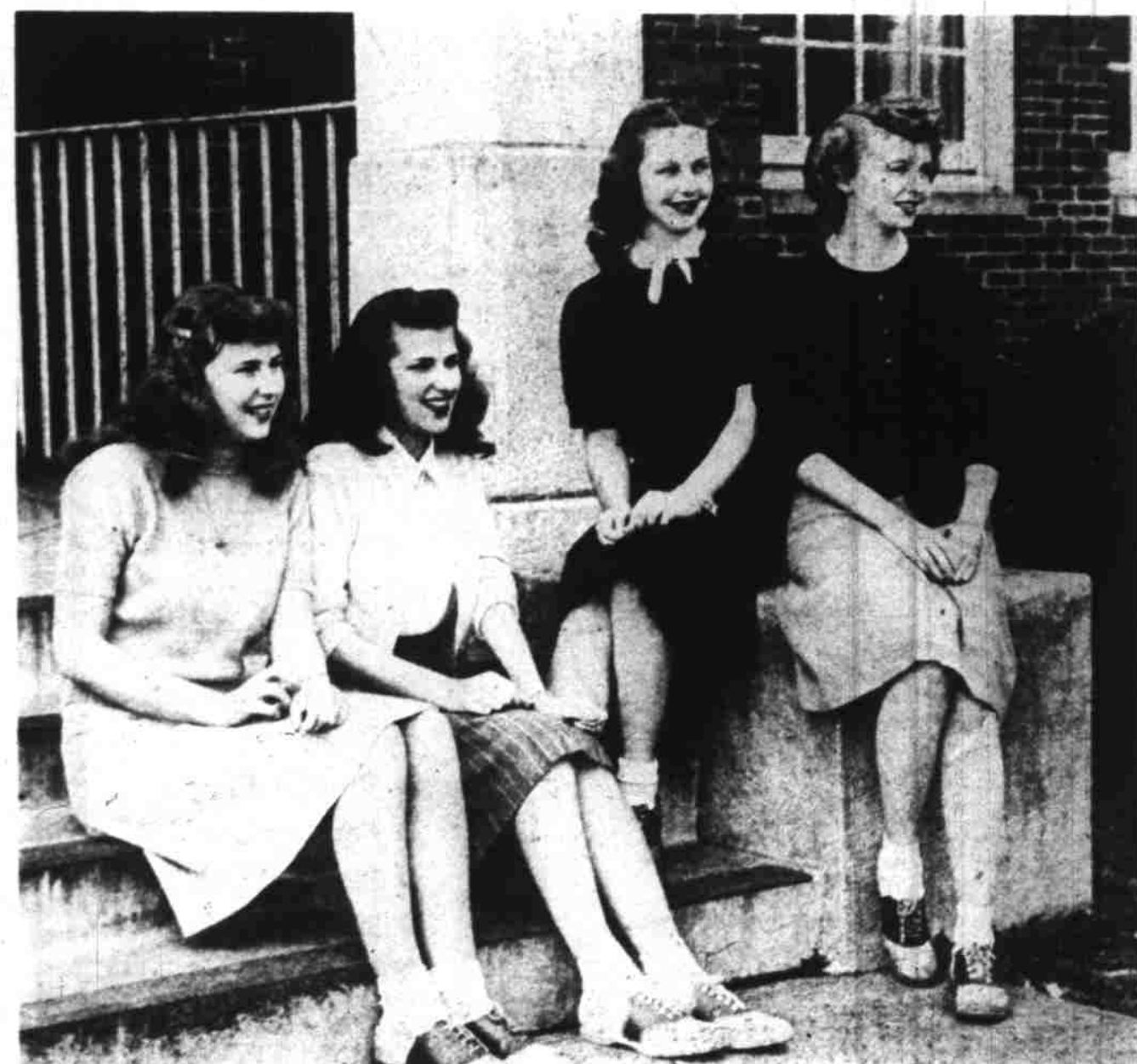
