Bells to Play This Morning

The bells, first of its kind to be installed in Oregon, have a hearing radius of two miles though there are similar ones in Washington and in the east.

There are 25 bells, electronically amplified from a keyboard adjacent to the organ in the church. There are two controls, one for use in the sanctuary only and the other for outside amplifying.

Playing of the bells has been arranged so as not to interfere with services of other churches. They will be given at 9:30 and 12:15 on Sundays and during the week at the angles hour.

The carillon bells will be transferred to the new church building.
