Forty Hospital Administrators Will Meet Here

Forty representatives of hospital administrative staffs from over Oregon, outside of Portland, will gather here Thursday for a meeting of the Oregon Council of Hospitals, to be held at the Marion hotel.

Lillian McDonald, superintendent at Salem General hospital, is to preside at the afternoon session, featuring a round table discussion of nursing problems scheduled for 2 p. m. Recruiting of students, questions of offering stipends, providing assistance for needy students, methods of attracting graduates to hospital positions and why there is difficulty in securing graduate nurses will be discussed at that time.

A presentation of the counseling and placement service of the American Hospital association will close the discussion, of which Henrietta Doltz, department of nursing education, University of Oregon, is to be leader.

Following the 9 a. m. registration, Mayor I. M. Doughton will give the address of welcome to visiting administrators. A round table discussion of hospital costs will occupy much of the morning.

Scouts Collect More Than 30 Tons Clothing

More than 30 tons of clothing, total of last year's drive, was collected Sunday by Salem Boy Scouts from homes throughout the city. Added to Friday's collection of 10 tons from local schools and with rural schools and, outlying communities yet to be accounted for, the UNRRA clothing drive will probably double last year's effort.

In Sunday's pickup, Scouts found that semi-suburban sections of the city contributed much more heavily than did the more densely populated districts and apartment house areas, said Lyle Leighton, Salem Scout executive. He further indicated that the Englewood district could probably claim city top honors in clothing contributions.

Leighton said that the entire cost of the drive was kept at around \$75, to be shared equally by local Lions, Rotary and Kiwanis clubs.

A fleet of 30 trucks under the direction of Hugh Craven accompanied the Scouts on their trips Sunday. The clothing is stored at the R. L. Elstrom warehouse from where a Lions club committee under the supervision of Floyd Seamster has already sent 30 tons to the Portland procurement division.

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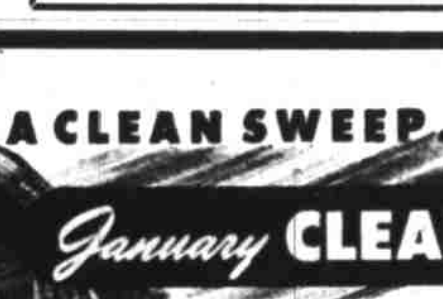
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
