MOLASSES FRUIT-NUT BAR

1/2 cup shortening
1 cup molasses
1 egg
2 cups sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon each cinnamon, ginger and allspice
2 teaspoons grated lemon rind
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1 cup chopped raisins

Sift dry ingredients together. Cut in shortening. Add nuts, lemon rind and dried fruit. Add egg and 1/4 cup molasses. Stir until all ingredients are blended. Add remaining molasses. Mix well. Chill several hours to increase ease of handling. Slightly grease and flour two long cookie tins. Divide dough into four parts. With hands form into a roll the length of cookie sheet. Place two rolls on each tin. Flatten to 1/4" thick. Bake 15 minutes in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees). Remove from oven. While hot, cut each strip crosswise into 10 pieces. Yield: about 40 bars.

For drop cookies: Do not chill. Drop from teaspoon onto cookie sheet.
