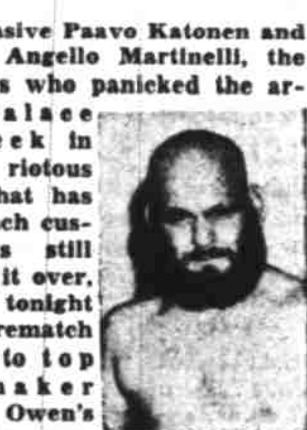
Stayton 15, Canby 13
