Sheriff's Office Plan Fire-Arm Registration

Sheriff Denver Young has established a fire-arm registration department in the sheriff's office in the county court house. Deputy Sheriff James Garvin announced Tuesday.

The service is open to all citizens of Marion county, is not compulsory and should not be confused with licensing of fire-arms, Garvin said. The purpose of the department is to register the serial number, and make an accurate description of fire-arms, so that in the event a gun is lost or stolen it can be more easily recovered. The reason for the new service arose out of the fact that a number of guns have been reported missing in recent months and nine out of ten owners did not know the number of their missing pieces, Garvin stated.

Anyone desiring to take advantage of this registration service may do so by bringing their fire-arms to the sheriff's office any day except Sundays between the hours of 9 a. m. and 4:30 p. m.
