Shipyard Pay Boost Okehed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Government procurement agencies today recommended a 15 per cent wage increase for approximately 650,000 shipyard workers throughout the nation.

The proposal was made to the working committee of the shipbuilding wage stabilization conference in an effort to break a deadlock in wage discussions which has tied up the conference since last December 4.

Sponsoring the offer were the war and navy departments, the maritime commission and the labor department.

Comdr. Hal Wright of the navy department presented the 15 per cent offer, which would mean an increase of about 18 cents an hour for standard mechanics in shipyards who now receive \$1.20.

Day's Fresh Snow Heavy, Wet in Passes

Heavy snow in the Cascade mountain passes was reported today by the state highway commission.

The daily road report: Government Camp -- Snowing lightly, 30 degrees. Six inches new snow, very wet from Twin Bridges to Bear Springs. Total snow 52 inches.

Santiam Junction -- Snowing hard, 32 degrees, been snowing hard all night between mileposts 75 and 85. Raining hard on South Santiam highway. Snow extremely heavy and wet. Packed snow across summit.

Odell Lake -- Snowing hard, 31 degrees, total snow at summit 104 inches. Packed snow to milepost 57. Still one-way traffic above Oakridge.

Siskiyou Summit -- Raining.

Klamath Falls -- Nine inches new snow at Sun mountain, 102 inches total snow. Raining on Greenspring highway, light snow at Quartz mountain and in Klamath Falls.

Meacham -- Cloudy, snowed most of night. Eleven inches new snow last night. Packed snow part of way on Old Oregon Trail between LaGrande and Pendleton.

Burns -- Two inches new snow, turned to rain today. Some packed snow on roads.

Geologist Tells Of Oil Drilling

The work of prospecting and drilling for oil was explained to the Salem Kiwanis club Tuesday by G. J. Long, geologist for the Standard Oil company of California, who has been studying the Willamette valley area for some time.

Long said that despite scientific advancements in the locating of oil, the only way to definitely prove its whereabouts is by drilling. Charts and drawings were exhibited to clarify various stages in oil recovery, and the use of dynamite charges -- set at an average depth of 50 feet -- was described. The charges create a radiation-reflection to show the earth formations.

Red Cross Campaign to Stress Continued Need of GIs, Vets

"Red Cross services to the armed forces and to veterans will receive primary emphasis in the months ahead," reports Justice George Rossman, chairman of the Marion county chapter, adding, that this year's appeal for funds, starting March 1 throughout the nation, will be based primarily on the continuing need for these services by the Red Cross.

For the men still overseas, American Red Cross is continuing to provide more than 600 on-and-off post clubs and recreational facilities of various kinds, including movies, information centers, and canteens, Justice Rossman says. With time hanging heavily for many a serviceman overseas, such facilities have a role now that is as important as it was during the war, the local chapter chairman believes.

Home Service Available Home service in the Marion county chapter, as in others throughout the nation, is available also at all times to assist families of men in service as well as veterans and their families. It is pointed out; financial aid, advice and assistance in solving family problems and emergency communications between the man overseas and his family being among the services that each chapter offers.

Hospital Service Included Included among services to the armed forces also is Red Cross hospital service, which, at the end of 1945, was established in 335 army and navy hospitals throughout the United States. Working in this program are the medical and psychiatric social workers and Red Cross volunteer workers.

Rev. Kleen, former pastor at Lebanon, will start his new work February 1. Bishop Baxter said the position emphasizes evangelism and "the deepening of the spiritual life throughout the church."
