

West Hangs Up New Record in Farm Produce

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Preliminary surveys indicated today the far west had hung up a new record in value of farm production in 1945.

The federal department of agriculture's compilation of farm income from products sold was \$3,051,000,000 for the first 10 months of 1945, more than \$100,000,000 higher than that for 1944.

The department added that before complete figures for the year were tabulated, a betterment in returns from livestock had been noted, with the west out in the lead. The department commented:

"Income from livestock and livestock products (for the nation) increased 4 per cent in October over the same month in 1944. Cash receipts ranged from 16 per cent above 1944 in the western region to 7 per cent below 1944 in the east north central region.

"Gains in income from cattle, turkeys, sheep and lambs, and wholesale milk in the western region were sufficiently large to outweigh severe declines in cash receipts from hogs and butterfat.

"Income from turkeys showed especially large gains in Washington, Oregon and California."

The federal report indicated California had nearly half the farm income of the 11 western states. Others topping the 1944 figures were Montana, Idaho, New Mexico, Arizona, Utah, Nevada, Washington and Oregon. On the minus side were Wyoming and Colorado.

NEW REGIONAL FORESTER

U.S., England, Russia Divide German Fleet

LONDON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—An American, Russian and British communique said tonight that "operable surface units" of the German fleet, together with 30 submarines, would be divided equally among the big three.

A total of 1,789 ships is involved—two cruisers, 30 destroyers and torpedo boats, 30 submarines, 48 depot ships and 1,679 "other units," including minesweepers, harbor patrol craft and similar ships.

Besides the 10 U-boats apiece, each nation gets: United States—The 10,000-ton cruiser Prinz Eugen, seven destroyers and torpedo boats, 12 depot ships and 560 other units.

Russia—The 6,000-ton cruiser Nurenborg, 10 destroyers and torpedo boats, 15 depot ships and 507 other units.

Britain—13 destroyers and torpedo boats, 21 depot ships and 612 other units.

All of Germany's battleships were sunk during the war and the split-up leaves Germany with no combat navy. Her merchant fleet, a British source said, will be divided later although the Germans will be allowed to retain fishing vessels with which to help feed her population.

Some of the allocated vessels already have sailed to ports of their new owners while the others wait to be picked up in German ports.

The British government, it was disclosed, has offered to transfer a number of warships allotted to the United Kingdom to the French government and negotiations now are underway.

Active Grain Deliveries Rise

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Active grain deliveries advanced sharply in today's trading after an easy start, when rye slumped more than 2 cents, and other grains showed an inclination to follow its lead.

Before the day's shooting was finished, May rye had advanced the full 5-cent daily trading limit, and other deliveries of rye were firmly at the \$1.44½ ceiling.

The bulk of the trading activities centered in oats.

At the finish wheat was unchanged to 1½ higher than yesterday's close, May \$1.80½. Corn was unchanged at 11½¢. Rye was unchanged to 5 cents higher, May \$1.97½, and barley was unchanged to 3 cents higher, May \$1.22½.

Wheat was generally inclined to follow other grains, and offerings were light.
