They Still Pay

Housewife, Still Facing Shortages, Still Serves Three Good Meals Daily

The woman is continuing to pay and pay. At war's end it seemed that the poor housewife would be cooking again with plenty of butter, meat, sugar and other things that by rights are necessities. We thought we would be able to replace old electrical appliances, get new refrigerators and put in replacements on stoves.

This business of serving three meals a day must go on, year after year, even though sugar remains at a premium, meat may soon be short again, butter has been almost out of the market for weeks, other shortages are unavailable except occasionally and worn out equipment must be used for awhile yet.

Women have a way of coming through, no matter what the odds, and we've failed to find a single home where the fare is not seemingly at a normal level.

A woman can add a lot of interest to a meal by serving hot breads. Yeast bread making is a simple process to the woman who once tackled and conquers it. There's nothing in yeast bread that's unavailable. Home made bread served fresh always pleases diners and inexpensive variations can be made. There are pan rolls and fancier rolls such as orange marmalade pin-wheels that take a little sweetening but not too much. One can add a little more shortening to the dough, spread with more sugar, add corn syrup or other sweetening, sprinkle liberally with cinnamon and roll up to make cinnamon rolls.

Here is a yeast bun recipe that uses no sugar and may be varied with nuts or dried fruit on hand. This is the way the molasses people sent it:

MOLASSES PECAN BUNS
1 cup lukewarm milk
1/2 cup shortening, melted
1 cake yeast
2 eggs, beaten
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/2 pint sour cream
5 cups sifted all-purpose flour
Shortening

1 cup molasses
1 cup chopped pecans
1/2 cup chopped raisins
1 teaspoon cinnamon

Add shortening and crumbled yeast cake to lukewarm milk, stirring until yeast is dissolved. Combine eggs, salt and sour cream and stir into first mixture. Add flour, and combine thoroughly. Place in greased bowl, cover with waxed paper and store in refrigerator over night. Cut dough in half and roll each half on lightly floured board into a 12"x8" rectangle. Brush each half with melted shortening and spread with 1/4 cup molasses, 1/2 cup nuts, 1/2 cup raisins and 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon. Grasp longest edge and roll as for jelly roll. Cut into 1 1/2 inch pieces. Spread generous amount of shortening into 10x6x2" baking pan and cover with 1/2 cup molasses. Place rolls cut side down in pan. Repeat for other half of dough. Cover with cloth. Place in warm place (80-85 degrees) for about one hour or until rolls are doubled in bulk. Bake in oven of 400 degrees for 10 minutes; reduce heat to 350 degrees and continue baking 15 minutes or until rolls are done. Invert on cake rack as soon as removed from oven. Makes about 16 rolls.

If sour cream is not available use an equal amount of sweet cream or evaporated milk and put a teaspoon of vinegar or lemon juice into it, letting stand for 10 to 15 minutes to sour it.

TURNER, Jan. 23 (Special)—Milford R. Archibald, Jr., RDM 3/c, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. R. Archibald of Turner, writes that he has been transferred from the USS Mackinac to the USS Gardner Bay. Both vessels are sea-plane tenders. He has been stationed in Tokyo bay since the close of the war. The Mackinac was among the first ships to enter the bay, having formed part of the escort to the large hospital ship, Benevolence.

On the way from Okinawa, the Mackinac sighted and destroyed a large mine that was floating directly in the pathway of the hospital ship, the Archibalds have been informed.

The Gardner Bay is now at Nagoya and young Archibald writes it will go to Shanghai next. He has been in the South Pacific and Japan since last April, going first to Pearl Harbor, then Guam, Saipan and Okinawa. He writes of visiting interesting places in Japan and that he has a number of souvenirs and yards of silk.

Smith, with his wife and children, Linda Dale and Steven, has just left for New London, Conn., submarine base, where he will be engaged in experimental work and new construction for the ensuing year.

Mr. Smith wears four battle stars for campaigns in the Asiatic theatre, Philippines and Japan. He enlisted in the navy six years ago and will remain in the service. He is a graduate of Salem high school and attended Willamette university. His family lived in Portland while he was overseas.

A brother, Don C. Smith, Jr., was also home last month from the service. Now discharged, he served as a first lieutenant in the signal corps in Africa, Italy and the European theatre. He wore six battle stars. He plans to attend the University of Southern California this spring.

Still Testing Sulfa For Bee Disease

Feeding sulfa drugs for the elimination of American foul-brood, bee disease, is still in the experimental stage. A Burr Black, apiary supervisor for the state agricultural department, announced here Wednesday.

Black said while use of sulphadiazine had indicated some good results, experiments had not been definite. He urged bee keepers to wait a year or two before they go all out for feeding these drugs to bees.

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Varied Shipments Are Billed for UAL's Initial Air Freight Service

Everything from fashions to automobile parts and from fresh fruits to live animals is being billed for shipment on United Air Lines' inaugural air freight service between Salem and other points along United's coast-to-coast and Pacific coast system February 1, according to W. T. McIntyre, Salem manager for UAL.

United's new air low rate freight tariff is designed to accommodate heavy package type shipments as distinguished from air express. Minimum weight of an air freight shipment is 25 pounds.
