Stock Prices Rising Again

NEW YORK, Jan. 23 (AP)—Stock market prices rose fractions to 2 points and more today with expanded dealings centering in utilities, steels, rails, motors and miscellaneous industrials. Low-priced utilities were especially popular and plus marks were chalked up by United Corp., Columbia Gas, Commonwealth & Southern, Laclede Gas and Electric Power & Light. Aircrafts also did well. Schenley lost about half of its sharp rise of yesterday on news of a proposed 10-for-7 stock split-up, finishing 3/4 lower. But National Distillers and Distillers Corp. displayed strength. The Associated Press 60-stock composite advanced .7 of a point to 78.1—within 1.6 of the 15-year top set January 16.

The annual meeting of shareholders of the Farmers' Cooperative Creamery of Carlton, Oregon's third largest creamery, will be held here on January 30, organization officials report. About 1500 are expected to attend. The session will open at 1:30 at Mack theatre following a luncheon at the creamery plant. Herman Bernards, president of the board of directors, will preside. Firm secretary and general manager is Jack S. Wright. Directors retiring are Julius Missen, N. B. Tibble, W. H. Milne and R. B. Joyce. Reports show the creamery handled 46 per cent more butterfat in 1945 than in the previous year. Changing the creamery name to "Farmers' Cooperative Creamery of McMinville" will be considered at the business session.
