Mollie Bones Munding, resident of Salem since 1902, died Thursday night at her home, 1740 Berry st., after three weeks of illness following a heart attack. Funeral services are set for 1:30 p.m. Monday from W. J. Rigdon Co.

Born in Clayborn county, Tenn., Jan. 15, 1880, she came with other members of her family to Oregon in 1899. They made their home at McMinnville. On Nov. 20, 1901, she was married at the Yamhill county seat to Clarence Munding, who survives her.

Mrs. Munding was a member of the Calvary Baptist church.

Surviving in addition to the widower are one son, Ersel R. Munding, Salem; sisters, Cora S. Scott and Emma Standifer, Salem; and Martha J. Winkler, Vancouver, Wash.; brothers, Arch L. Bones, Salem, and Vester N. Bones, Turner; and one granddaughter, Lola Anne Munding, Salem.

22,959 GIs to Dock at Coast Ports Today

Approximately 22,959 European and Pacific service veterans are scheduled to arrive at U.S. ports on 27 vessels today.

Five west coast points expect arrival of 21 vessels carrying at least 13,320 men.

West coast arrivals include: San Diego, at least 209 men on four vessels; Los Angeles, 7401, 12 ships; San Francisco, 5610, three ships.

At San Diego—Miscellaneous on following: Escort carrier Bairoko, 142 navy; destroyer transport Framont, 167 navy; LCTs 1000 and 1008, no passenger information.

At Los Angeles—Miscellaneous on following vessels: Gallatin from Manila, 1532; Athene from Saipan, 483; Hope from Manila, 765; McCracken from Manila, 1-532; Springfield from Tientsin, 656; St. Paul from Pearl Harbor, 562; Comet from Manila, 159; five destroyer escorts from Pearl Harbor, 302.
