

Credit Group Report Shows Loans on Rise

Loan volume of the Willamette Production Credit association for the year 1945 totaled \$2,235,000, it was shown in the report made by John D. Bryant, acting secretary-treasurer, at the 12th annual meeting of the association at the Salem American Legion hall Thursday. The amount represents a 19.8 per cent increase over the previous year.

Repayments during 1945 were slightly above normal, totalling \$2,150,000, reflecting good crops and favorable market prices, Bryant said.

The association finished the year with 629 members, 30 more than last year. Bryant pointed out there had been many more new ones added, but that a large number of members paid up their debts and sold their stock.

Directors Named

Member ownership of stock now stands at \$126,325, while accumulated earnings are \$36,832. George F. Fullenwider, Carlton, and R. W. Reed, Creswell, were re-elected directors. Other association directors are Claude Buchanan, Corvallis; E. W. McMindes, Astoria, and J. W. Ramage, Woodburn.

Officers are president, Fullenwider; vice president, Buchanan; acting secretary-treasurer, Bryant. Capt. Phil M. Brandt, Jr., who is again a civilian, was introduced. Announcement was made that he would return as secretary-treasurer of the organization February 1, but that Bryant would remain with the group in another capacity.

The Portland club, which now

owns the Senators, has many players returning from the service and must have a place to keep its excess personnel, Emigh explained.

As a commercialized sport, baseball provides jobs for many besides actual players, he pointed out. Parks must be cared for, transportation provided, news gathered and edited and numerous other tasks performed. Approximately 40 leagues will be in operation this year he said.

Emigh explained the various classes of leagues ranging down from the major, in which every player hopes some time to participate, through the AAA of the

Pacific Coast league and the B class of the Western International to a class D. The classifications provide salary limits, draft prices and player limits for the teams involved.

The Senators will have 16 players among whom, except for the

player-manager, \$3000 a month in salaries is to be divided. When they travel, each man is provided with hotel room and meals. All clubs in the W I league expect to use chartered bus service for travel this year.
