Red Cross Plans Drive, In Dallas

DALLAS, Jan. 25—(Special)—Three divisions of work of the American Red Cross, all of which evolve through the local county chapters, were stressed by Josephine David, field representative of the San Francisco office, when she spoke to a meeting of Polk county chapter workers Monday night in the Red Cross rooms.

For the discharged veteran, Red Cross home service explains his rights and benefits, files pension claims, helps prepare and file all necessary legal documents. If hospital care is needed, the Red Cross makes arrangements. If the veteran is disabled and needs financial assistance, the chapter takes care of that. A total of 80 per cent of claims filed to the veterans administration come through Red Cross, she said.

The local group, with Miss David, planned a quick and intensive campaign for the 1946 drive which starts March 1. Practically the same organization as that of the war fund campaign of 1945 will handle this year's campaign, according to A. V. Oliver, chapter chairman, who presided at the meeting.

Among those present at the meeting were George Kurte, 1946 drive chairman, and Mrs. Kurte, George Woods and W. A. Barnum, vice chairmen of the chapter. Walter Craven, treasurer, Mrs. A. J. Cleveland, secretary, Mr. and Mrs. Fay Morrison of Perrydale and Mrs. W. S. Tilgner of route 2, Dallas.

Miss David arrived Monday and will assist other counties with organization for the drive before returning to San Francisco. She will be in Dallas again on February 26 to help start the drive.

Trading in May Rye Advances

CHICAGO, Jan. 25—(AP)—Trading in May rye fell in step with the Winnipeg market today and the grain closed as much as 3 1/2 cents a bushel higher than yesterday's finish. After sagging around a cent in early dealings, buying support came into the pit starting a slow climb which carried to a net gain of 4 1/2 cents shortly before the close. Some of the extreme advance was lost on profit taking.

Trading in all pits was slow as most brokers remained out of the market awaiting the government report on stocks of grain in all positions on January 1.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1/2 cent above yesterday's finish, May \$1.80 1/2; corn unchanged at \$1.18 1/2; soybeans unchanged to 3/4 up, May 81; rye unchanged to 3/4 higher, May \$1.99 1/2; barley unchanged, May \$1.22 1/2.

Steels, Rails Sustain Loss

NEW YORK, Jan. 25—(AP)—Steels, rails and a wide assortment of standard issues were lower in today's stock market but a handful of specialties rose 1 1/2 to more than 4 points.

Declines in the majority almost from the start, exceeded a point in many cases at the worst, but there were numerous recoveries in the final few minutes. Utilities were the best performers on this move.

The three major groups in the Associated Press averages were

down .1 to 2 of a point and the 60-stock total ended off .1 at 78.3. Transfers of 1,700,000 shares compared with 2,210,000 on Thursday.

American Woolen common advanced to a new high at 57 and then slipped back to end at 54 1/2, up 4 1/2. Wyandotte Worsted traded with a net gain of 3 1/2 at 33 1/2, Paramount held an advance of 4 points at 64.
