CIO BACKS PLANT SEIZURE 3 Jet Planes Break Trans-U.S. Record

NEW YORK, Jan. 26 .- (AP)-The transcontinental flight record was shattered today by three U. S. army jet-propelled planes, which streaked from Long Beach, Calif., to LaGuardia field at speeds approaching that of sound.

All three planes were Lockheed P-80 pursuit ships. The one piloted by Col. William H. Councill, flight test official from Wright Field, O., flew nonstop and covered the 2470 mile distance

State Dean Acheson's recent statement that he believed no definite commitments were made at Yalta, and said Tass, official soviet news agency, had been "officially authorized" to disclose that Russia would get the Kuriles, southern Sakhalin and adjacent islands.

"On the question of the Kurile islands, Mr. Acheson is definitely wrong," the Tass statement was quoted as saying.


