OPA CITES OVERCHARGE

Proprietors of the Dorchester house, Ocean Lake, have made a settlement of \$375.38 to the U. S. treasury for alleged overcharges on food items served in the restaurant, the OPA enforcement section reported. The price panel at Toledo had found sales above ceiling prices and arranged for the settlement.

State's Private Building to Top \$100 Million

Private, postwar construction in Oregon probably will exceed \$100,000,000, with many projects already to proceed as soon as materials and manpower are available, the Oregon postwar development and reconstruction commission reported to Gov. Earl Snell here Saturday. John W. Kelly is executive secretary of the commission.

Utility construction was estimated by Kelly at approximately \$55,000,000 with public works projects, in addition, amounting to \$660,000,000. Appropriations for many of these public works projects already have been approved while others were expected to receive favorable consideration within the next few months. Kelly said a large percentage of the private construction was originally planned for the year 1946, but may be delayed because of strikes

and other uncertain conditions. The commission report also emphasized that the year 1946 would see a noticeable expansion in rural electrification which would necessitate new power plants and enlargement of many of those now in operation. There also is a peak demand for telephone installations in the rural districts, the report continued.

Farrell Reports Increased Speed On State's Roads

Prevailing speeds on Oregon highways continued to increase during December, Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, Jr., reported here Saturday.

During December the ceiling speed for 85 per cent of the drivers was 56 miles an hour, with only three per cent of the drivers holding their speed under 35 miles an hour.

Farrell said high speed is responsible for approximately 85 per cent of Oregon's traffic accidents.
