Igor Stravinsky, Eugene Ormandy and Arturo Toscanini will be conductors in programs scheduled for airing today on national networks.

An all-Jerome Kern program will be given on the "Harvest of Stars" program at 11 on NBC this morning. Howard Barlow will direct the orchestra and Lynn Murray the chorus.

At 11:30 John Charles Thomas will sing "Song of Songs" by Moya and "Credo" from "Othello" by Verdi and the orchestra will play "I'll Walk Alone" by Stayne, "Little Brown Jug" and the chorus will sing "Sweet Lullaby" by Owens and "Our God Our Help in Ages Past" by Croft.

Igor Stravinsky will direct the New York Philharmonic symphony concert in orchestra in a noon time concert of his own compositions on CBS. The program includes "Fireworks," a symphony in three movements, "Scenes de Ballet" and the new suite from "Petrouchka."

Nelson Eddy will sing on his regular 1:30 program on CBS and Patrice Munnell will be soloist on the "Family Hour" at 2, also on CBS.

At 2 o'clock, Toscanini will direct the NBC orchestra in Mozart's overture to "Don Giovanni" and symphony No. 40 in G minor and in three Verdi compositions, overture to "La Forza del Destino," string quartet in E minor and dances from "Othello."

On the "American Album of Familiar Music" program are listed the works of Friml, Coward, Sibelius, Lecuona, Masse, Bond and Leoncavallo. An all-Jerome Kern program is planned for the "Hour of Charm" concert at 7 o'clock. Both programs are on NBC.

Igor Gofin will appear on the "Voice of Firestone" program on Monday at 5:30 p. m. on NBC. He'll sing "Hills of Home," "The Trumpeter," "Softly Now the Light of Day" and "Song of Songs."
