James Ripp, Sublimity Mail Carrier Starting 31st Year

STAYTON, Jan. 28.—(Special)—James Ripp of Sublimity, considered one of the oldest rural mail carriers in point of service in Marion county, started his 31st year as a carrier on Sublimity RFD 1, Wednesday, January 16. Ripp started carrying mail January 16, 1915. The route extends from Sublimity to Silver Creek Falls.

In all the years of service he has failed to deliver mail only once and that was Dec. 11, 1919, when there was two feet of snow and the mail did not even get to the postoffice. Mail was lighter in the "horse and buggy days," he says.

Ripp owned 11 horses and used that many more, wore out three carts, two buggies and a sleigh. He has driven 20 cars, and estimated that he has driven 30,000 miles by horse and 300,000 by car. He calculated that in the 31 years he has delivered three million pieces of mail, or more than an average of two tons of mail per box in the same period. Peter J. Gries has acted as Ripp's substitute for many years.

For the first time Ripp took time off during Christmas holiday. But a year ago he went to California to see his son, William Ripp, who was in an army camp and due to go overseas. The Ripp family, including his wife, three sons, and a daughter, reside near Sublimity. William, at present, is home on a furlough.
