

Salem Police Recover Loot, Hold Two Men

Two recent Salem house burglaries were cleared up, according to local police, with the arrest Saturday night of Clifford H. Bingham and Lloyd Earl Fitzhugh.

Bingham is held in city jail on a charge of possessing stolen property and Fitzhugh is held for the grand jury after waiving preliminary hearings, Monday, on a charge of burglary.

The two burglaries reportedly admitted by Fitzhugh in a signed statement were those of the Fred Burlingham home at 360 N. 14th st., and the D. M. Devall home, 805 N. Church st., both in the last week.

Gems in Socks
Tipoff of the burglaries came when police were searching Bingham at his room in the Argo hotel. When he removed his socks, a small envelope dropped out. It contained a pearl and four loose stones, identified as having been taken from a pin stolen from the Devall home, but a diamond in the pin was still missing.

After further questioning Bingham was said to have admitted that he had sold the stone and a wrist watch in Woodburn. He claimed these had been given him by Fitzhugh.

Wrist Watch Found
Later, Bingham told officers that there was a wrist watch and some rings hidden in his room. Officers could not find them at the place mentioned, but Bingham's brother, Jess, produced them from a bath room, and also produced a sea bag containing two men's suits, a suit coat and a pair of suspenders. These were identified by Clifford Bingham at headquarters, who said he hadn't mentioned them because he didn't want to involve his brother. Jess Bingham was not held.

In addition to the articles recovered from the Bingham room, Fitzhugh said he had hidden a radio in the city park, which was gone when he returned to locate it and had hidden a wrist watch in a waste basket at the City Ice Co. He absolved everybody but himself from the crimes in the statement signed Sunday.

Agency Urges Insurance Plan

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—(AP)—The federal security agency today called for a broader old-age insurance system including credits for veterans for time spent in service.

There was no elaboration in the report of the recommendation that veterans be credited with payments on federal old-age and survivors insurance for the period they were in uniform.

The report to congress also recommended medical insurance; replacement of existing federal-state unemployment insurance programs with a single national program; expansion of the unemployment insurance program to include all workers in industries presently covered, and as many non-covered groups "as is administratively feasible," and payment of maximum weekly jobless benefits of at least \$25, for up to 26 weeks.

Morse Berates Fact-Finders

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Senator Morse (R-Ore), former public member of the war labor board, today advocated settlement of differences between management and labor by voluntary arbitration rather than by fact-finding procedures or compulsory arbitration.

"Fact-finders are not limited to the evidence of data the parties present and the parties involved have no chance to present rebuttal evidence until a decision is rendered," he said.

"Under a compulsory arbitration approach, the arbitration tribunal inevitably becomes the dictator of economic policy with the result that, if its decisions are enforced, inherent managerial rights of industry and free collective bargaining rights of labor are destroyed."

Mt. Angel Firm Totals Output

MT. ANGEL, Jan. 28.—(Special) Mt. Angel Co-operative Creamery's 1945 business of \$1,803,416.15 was \$200,000 short of their 1944 total, the annual financial report showed.

A total of 2,080,489 pounds of butter was manufactured or 900,000 pounds less than in 1944 but it brought the total butter manufactured since the creamery opened to 44,532,864 pounds or more than 22,266 tons.

Cheese manufactured totaled 1,538,017 pounds with a value of \$439,168.78, more than double the 1944 production. Cream and milk business for the year totaled \$138,758.15 and was an almost entirely new business for the cooperative.

The milk handled totaled 37,041,317 pounds and powdered milk totaled 1,234,587 pounds. Ice cream manufactured totaled 6045 gallons or slightly more than 1944.

Santiam Highway Cleared, Reopened

The South Santiam highway, closed for several days because of a slide, was reopened late Saturday, R. H. Baldoe, state highway engineer, reported here Monday. He said snow was falling in the Santiam Junction district with a total of 113 inches of snow at the summit.

Six inches of new snow was reported to Government Camp with packed snow extending to Clear Lake.

EUGENE, Jan. 28.—(AP)—The Mount Vernon flood control association will ask congress for a \$100,000 special appropriation to rebuild the Natron levee near Jasper, washed out by the recent Willamette river flood. Army engineers who inspected the site agreed the levee needed replacement.

Duke Heiress Wins Supreme Court Decision

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Doris Duke Cromwell, tobacco heiress, won a supreme court fight today against a \$14,000,000 tax which the little township of Hillsborough, N. J., tried to collect from her.

The tribunal upheld, 7 to 0, the lower federal court decisions nullifying the levy.

The township sought to levy the tax against Mrs. Cromwell individually and as trustee of the Duke endowment, set up by her late father, James B. Duke, for the benefit of Duke university. The intangible personal property involved was assessed at \$221,940,438.

Attorney Charles E. Hughes, Jr., arguing for Mrs. Cromwell, laid Hillsborough, with an annual budget of around \$97,000, was singling out Mrs. Cromwell for "a discriminatory burden."

The supreme court failed again today to rule on the case of Japanese General Tomiyuko Yamashita, who is contesting the death sentence imposed on him by a military commission on a charge of condoning atrocities in the Philippines.

British Asking U.S. Permission to See Atom Bomb Tests

LONDON, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Britain desires to have military observers present when the United States conducts atom bomb tests on warships in May and conversations that end now are being held, Prime Minister Attlee told commons today.

A conservative member asked the prime minister "whether Britain has any rights in the atomic bomb at all now," but Attlee declined to answer, commenting that that was "a different question altogether."

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Sonja Henie, ice skating star, filed suit in superior court today for a divorce from Daniel R. Topping, millionaire New York sportsman, on charges of desertion.

Miss Henie and Topping were married July 4, 1940. The marriage was her first and Topping's third. He was divorced in May, 1940, from Arline Judge, movie actress.

Miss Henie's attorney, J. Arthur Friedlund, said last November that she met with Topping, upon his return from overseas service with the marine corps, and had decided to separate. She asked permission to resume her maiden name of Henie and did not mention alimony.

State Opens Murder Trial

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 28.—(AP)—Trial of Harold Wayne Hollister, 28, charged with first degree murder in the tavern hold-up slaying of Joe Mezzina here Nov. 11 was opened today.

A jury of seven women and five men heard Maxine Pinner, employee of the tavern, testify for the prosecution that Hollister, who was arrested in a Spokane, Wash., hold-up, was the gunman who shot Mezzina the night Mezzina died behind his bar while trying to shoot it out with the gunman.

Hangar Fire Takes 10 Lives

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Two more bodies were found tonight in the debris left by today's mammoth hangar fire at Tinker Field, raising the total dead to ten. Thirty-eight other persons were injured when gasoline-fed flames roared suddenly through the main hangar at this huge army air forces supply depot.

Cause of the fire was not officially determined. Col. Ralph O. Brownfield, deputy commander of the huge army air force supply depot, estimated total damage at \$750,000. The intense heat, which crumpled iron girders like wire, kept firemen from searching the ruins for several hours after the blaze was controlled.
