Snell Praises Flood Relief By Red Cross

Appreciation for relief provided by the American Red Cross during the recent Willamette river valley flood is expressed in a letter to Verne Simmons, Red Cross Pacific area manager, from Governor Earl Snell, according to word received by the Marion county chapter of Red Cross.

"The quick and effective action and assistance has been a wonderful contribution to the welfare of those who have suffered by the flood conditions," the governor's letter stated.

Emergency shelters were set up by the Red Cross chapters in the flooded areas of the valley to house victims who were evacuated from their homes, and meals were provided flood sufferers by chapter canteen corps. A program of Red Cross rehabilitation assistance is now underway for several hundred families in the region.
