Lanke Reports Funds Flowing At Rapid Rate

Unless funds are forthcoming soon the Marion county recorder's office will probably finish the fiscal year in the red, Herman W. Lanke, county recorder, stated Wednesday.

An unprecedented rise in the rate of military discharge recordings, oil and gas land leases recordings and property deeds recordings, together with the need for more office employees has already eaten away about two-thirds of the budget in seven months of the present fiscal year, Lanke said.

The recorder office budget for the entire fiscal year ending June 30, 1946, is set at \$12,800. Of this amount nearly \$8000 has been used, Lanke stated. In 1944 the photostatic machine required about \$175 per month to operate, but this year photostatic recordings account for about \$400 per month of budget money.

"This office has been understaffed for some time and has worked many overtime hours in order to keep up with the recording demands," Lanke said. He indicated that the county court must appropriate the necessary funds needed by the recorder's office from the emergency or some other fund.

Harry Collins Honored for PTT Service

A gold service emblem with five stars, representing 35 years of telephone service, was presented Wednesday to Harry V. Collins, district manager here for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company.

The presentation was made at a luncheon held in the Quells, with Fred Scholl, general commercial manager for Oregon, personally making the award.

Collins began his telephone phone career as manager with the company at Anacortes, Wash., in 1910. He subsequently served as manager at Kent, Centralia, Sedro - Woolley, Hoquiam and Aberdeen before being appointed an area manager in Seattle on October 1, 1927.

In March, 1928, he was transferred to Portland as an area manager and two years later on May 1, 1930, was made manager at Klamath Falls. In November of that year, he was appointed manager here at Salem and on October 1, 1931 was made a district manager for the Salem district.

In his more than 15 years of service in this district, Collins has been repeatedly commended for outstanding work in his telephone job and has been active in club and civic affairs.
