Rye Clipped 5 Cents Bushel In Grain Mart

CHICAGO, Jan. 30 (AP)—While brokers generally preferred to remain out of the market today pending some indication of action from Washington on price control and the grain supply situation, the unrestricted May rye price was clipped 5 cents a bushel.

Most of the light trading was in the erratic and ceilingless rye which fluctuated more than 7 cents during the session. At one time, it showed a gain of around a cent over yesterday's close on a sharp rally in cadence with a broad upturn at Winnipeg. Moderately heavy liquidation shortly before the close, however, bore it down the 5-cent net loss allowed in any one day.

All the deferred deliveries of oats were off fractionally most of the day under pressure of liquidation by professionals then dipped rapidly near the end. Wheat, corn and barley remained at their ceilings of \$1.80 1/2, \$1.18 1/2 and \$1.22 1/2 all day without attracting more than a few scattered offers to sell. Oats closed unchanged to 2 1/2 cents lower than the previous finish, May 81 cents; rye unchanged to 5 cents off, May \$2.07 1/2.

Industrials Up In Stock Mart

NEW YORK, Jan. 30 (AP)—Steels and assorted industrials rallied in today's stock market after early declines but the trend as a whole was lower.

Selective improvement was based on news that representatives of General Motors and the CIO United Auto Workers had agreed to resume direct wage negotiations. Another factor was the sending of a new strike control bill to the house floor for debate tomorrow.

Offsetting this was a report that the administration would go no higher than around \$4 a ton as an increase in steel prices plus U.S. Steel's statement that \$4 would cover neither the 18 1/2-cent hourly wage boost acceptable by the union nor 15 cents offered by the company.

Six Million Dollar Loss Suffered by Catholic Philippine Diocese

MT. ANGEL, Jan. 30 (Special)—The Rev. Antonio Radovan of Lipa south of Manila in the Philippines arrived at the Benedictine monastery here this week for a short visit, docking at Portland on Sunday.

Father Radovan has been sent to the United States by his bishop to tour the country and try to solicit funds to help rebuild the churches and schools destroyed by the war. His diocese, which was the one most heavily hit by destruction, shows a loss of \$6,000,000 in Catholic institutions. Nine of the priests of the diocese were killed.
