Mr. and Mrs. T. Dalke, Mr. and Mrs. A. Helvig and Ruth Helvig attended the ceremony.

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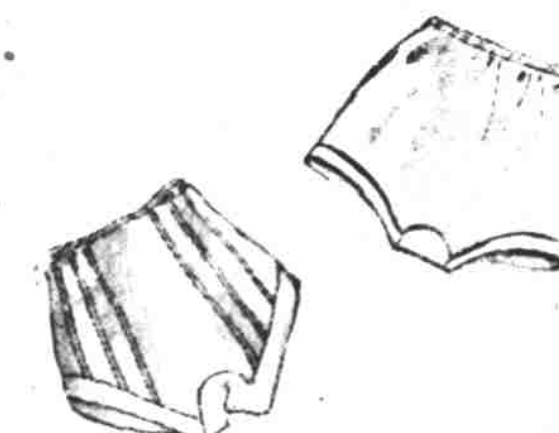
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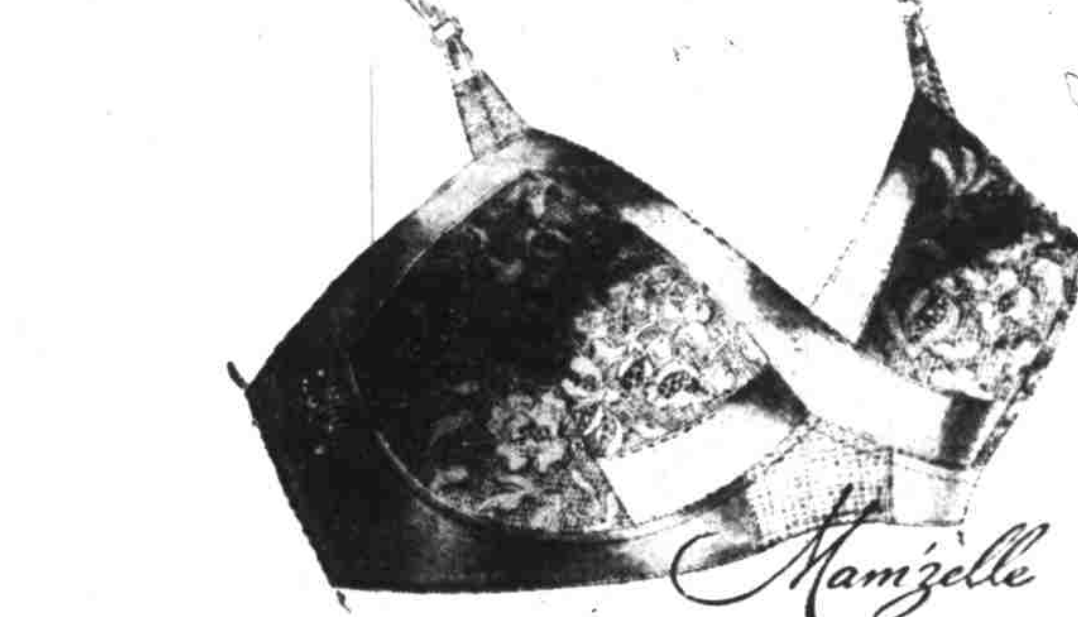
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
