

Russia Tries Veto In Fight Over Greece

LONDON, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Russia sought for the first time to use its veto power in the United Nations security council tonight in an effort to prevent action clearing charges of endangering the peace by keeping troops in Greece.

The potentially powerful, 11-nation council adjourned, however, without deciding whether the Russians, as a disputing party, could invoke the veto at this stage of the proceedings.

Russia raised the veto issue after six and one-half hours of sometimes acrimonious debate in which British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin gave "the direct" to Russian charges that Britain was guilty of endangering peace—the "most diabolical crime of mankind," Bevin said.

Only a few minutes earlier, Soviet Foreign Vice Commissar Andrei Vishinsky had dropped Russian demands for council action against British troops in Greece, although demanding assurance the forces would be withdrawn "as soon as possible."

'Rocket' Train Collision Kills One, Injures 2

WICHITA, Kan., Feb. 4.—(AP)—Colliding with a loaded sand truck at a grade crossing a mile south of Wichita, the Rock Island's southbound Rocket piled up this afternoon with a toll of one dead and two injured.

Approximately 100 passengers on the speeding streamliner were badly shaken. The engine and five of six coaches left the track.

Arthur Faber, 24, Wichita, the truck driver, was killed.

Two dining car employees were taken to a Wichita hospital for treatment of lacerations and undetermined internal injuries.

German Women Ask POW Release

FRANKFURT, Germany, Feb. 4.—(AP)—About 5000 German women, making the first public protest against policies of the occupation powers, held three meetings at Stuttgart during the weekend and demanded speedier release of German prisoners of war, the American-sponsored Dana news agency said today.

SP Resumes Overnight Merchandise Services

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 4.—(AP)—Overnight merchandise service for less than carload shipments between Portland and southern Oregon and the Coos Bay area was restored tonight, the Southern Pacific railroad announced. The service was halted late in 1942.

Sewer Fee to Be Studied; Annexations Given Boost; Street Work is Approved

Salem cannerymen, who put up principal opposition to earlier proposals that the city charge a monthly sewer-users' fee, have been asked to study the question further, Alderman C. F. French, chairman of the commission on sewerage and drainage, told the city council Monday night.

Without such a fee, Salem must add a millage tax to construct the new sewers the city needs, he maintained.

Annexation of suburban areas will mean huge new sewer construction projects, French reminded the council.

One annexation project was given a boost when the council authorized the mayor to sign a petition being circulated in Candelaria Heights and Buena Vista communities. Salem owns reservoir properties there. Alderman A. H. Gilie said he had asked for a delay in the matter two weeks ago because he understood some city officials were interested in the new residential addition properties included in the area, and he urged that any with an interest there "come out in the open now."

Part of Street Leased

For \$25 a month, the council leased the stretch of never-opened Water street at the foot of Court street to Clarence B. Feller and Georgia Rose Feller, who propose to construct gravel bunkers there. Gilie voted against the deal, declaring he thought the lease should bring at least \$50 a month.

The council voted approval of Willard Taylor's plan to construct new steps down the riverbank to his Salem Bouthouse, but emphasized that he would have to bear the cost.

An objection to noises made by Oregon Motor Stages at their 638 N. Front st. garage and at their parking site near Marion square was referred to committee.

Improvement of Olive street between 17th and Roeseke's addition and John street from Superior street south 150 feet was approved.

"No Surplus of Hydrants"

Requests from residents along South 12th and 13th streets for additional fire hydrants were returned to the council by the committee on fire department with a recommendation that they be filed, since the city has "no surplus of hydrants now."

City Sanitary service trucks aren't dropping the majority of the debris of which residents along the road to the garbage dump complain, an investigator committee reported, recommending that the road be policed to force drivers of all garbage-carrying vehicles to protect their cargoes.

Bids on a sprinkler system for the north side of Willson park, ranging from \$4000 to \$4500, were referred to park committee and park board with power to act.

Zone Painting Asked

The city recorder was instructed to write the highway commission asking that pedestrian zones be repainted near the state buildings on Court street, where Alderman David O'Hara, a state employee, declared "a veritable death trap" exists.

Sale of a small piece of property behind the Lions Den to the Hollywood Lions club for \$20 was approved. The property was appraised at \$10 but O'Hara and R. A. Forkner, councilmen, are members of the Lions club, so they asked the city treasurer to double the price, O'Hara explained.

An ordinance bill which would establish a 10-foot setback line for all construction on Portland and Fairgrounds roads from Church street to the city limits was read twice and a hearing called for February 18.

Zone Ordinance Eyed

Meantime, Salem city council is moving to change the zone of the Keith Brown industrial properties from residential to industrial and to close dedicated but never opened streets in the addition which lies north of the state fairgrounds in Condit's addition. Monday night against the opposition of Alderman David O'Hara and A. H. Gilie the council approved plans for the vacation and set March 18 as date for a public hearing. O'Hara said he would approve no vacation proceedings in which residents of the affected areas had not petitioned for the change.

Lumber Price Policy Feared In OPA Letter

SPOKANE, Feb. 4.—(AP)—A lumber industry spokesman said today the office of price administration had ruled that lumber firms must operate 25 per cent "in the red" for six months before increased ceiling prices would be granted for lumber.

Charles S. Hoffman, acting manager of the Timber Products Manufacturers' association in Spokane, said the policy was revealed in an OPA letter to the N. J. Carney Pole company of Ashland, Idaho, from M. H. Sperry, head of the OPA policy and post division.

"This is bad news," Hoffman said, "for presumably it would apply to the whole industry, not just to the pole companies."

Paris Radio Causes Panic

PARIS, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Parisian radio listeners were panic-stricken tonight by a too vivid radio play depicting atomic bomb experiments in the Pacific getting out of control and "blowing the earth to pieces."

It was only a play in news commentator style, but the hysteria of listeners who deluged police stations and newspaper offices with telephone calls approached that provoked several years ago in the United States by Orson Welles' radio drama concerning an invasion from Mars.

Capt. Safford Admits Aiding Kimmel Cause

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Navy Capt. L. F. Safford testified in the Pearl Harbor investigation today that he worked to get "things lined up" in Washington for "the cause" of exonerating Admiral Husband E. Kimmel, Pacific fleet commander when the Japanese attacked.

The testimony came out in questioning of Safford about a secret code letter he wrote in January, 1944, asserting that no one in the office of naval operations, which is the top naval command, "can be trusted."

Questioning turned to the letter after the witness had asserted, and then denied, that he was suspicious of General George C. Marshall and Admiral Harold R. Stark in what he insisted was the disappearance of naval records.

Missing, he said, are files on an intercepted Japanese message three days before Pearl Harbor which he said "meant war."

Offers \$6000 Ceiling for All New Houses

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—(AP)—An absolute ceiling of \$6000 on the price of new houses was proposed today by Rep. Patman (D-Tex.), as the house banking committee struggled over legislation intended to provide homes at prices veterans can pay.

The Texan made the proposal shortly after the committee, by an 11 to 9 party line vote, rejected a republican effort to erase from the Patman housing bill the provisions for expanding home price controls and for payment of subsidies on building materials.

"This is no time to build luxurious, expensive homes," Patman told reporters in disclosing he would offer an amendment intended to provide that no scarce materials shall be used in a dwelling to cost more than \$6000.

Big Supply Drops Egg Price 3 Cents In San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Eggs hit the San Francisco market by the carload today, and cracked the price under the wholesale ceiling for the first time since last summer.

Most grades dropped 3 cents a dozen, with grade A large eggs quoted by the federal state market service at 41½ cents, whole sale. They had been selling at the ceiling, 44½ cents.

Stores finally had all the eggs they could sell, after months of shortages.

Cortis D. Stringer, For State Senator

Cortis D. Stringer, Lebanon, Monday filed in the state department for state senator, second senatorial district, Linn county, at the democratic primary election in May. Stringer previously served as a member of the senate but has been out for several years.

Search on for Last Of Missing Bodies

ELK MOUNTAIN, Wyo., Feb. 4.—(AP)—A search party went up Elk mountain again today to look for the body of a soldier—last of the 21 persons who died in a United Air Lines transport crash on the peak Thursday.

The bodies of 11 other soldiers, six civilian passengers and three crew members already have been brought down the ice-covered mountain.

St. Louis School Strike Gives Pupils Vacation

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Seventy thousand school children enjoyed an unscheduled holiday today when a wage dispute between members of the AFL custodians and matrons union and the board of education led to a strike which forced all but 21 schools to suspend classes either because of lack of heat, water or food or because buildings were locked.

Warren, from Wolverhampton, England, said today that Rotarians throughout the world "will join forces with educators and the press to force international understandings by constant discussion of current events to prevent a third world war."

"The trouble now between Great Britain and Russia must be widely publicized," he declared, "and the issues explained to everybody if eventual misunderstanding is to be prevented."
